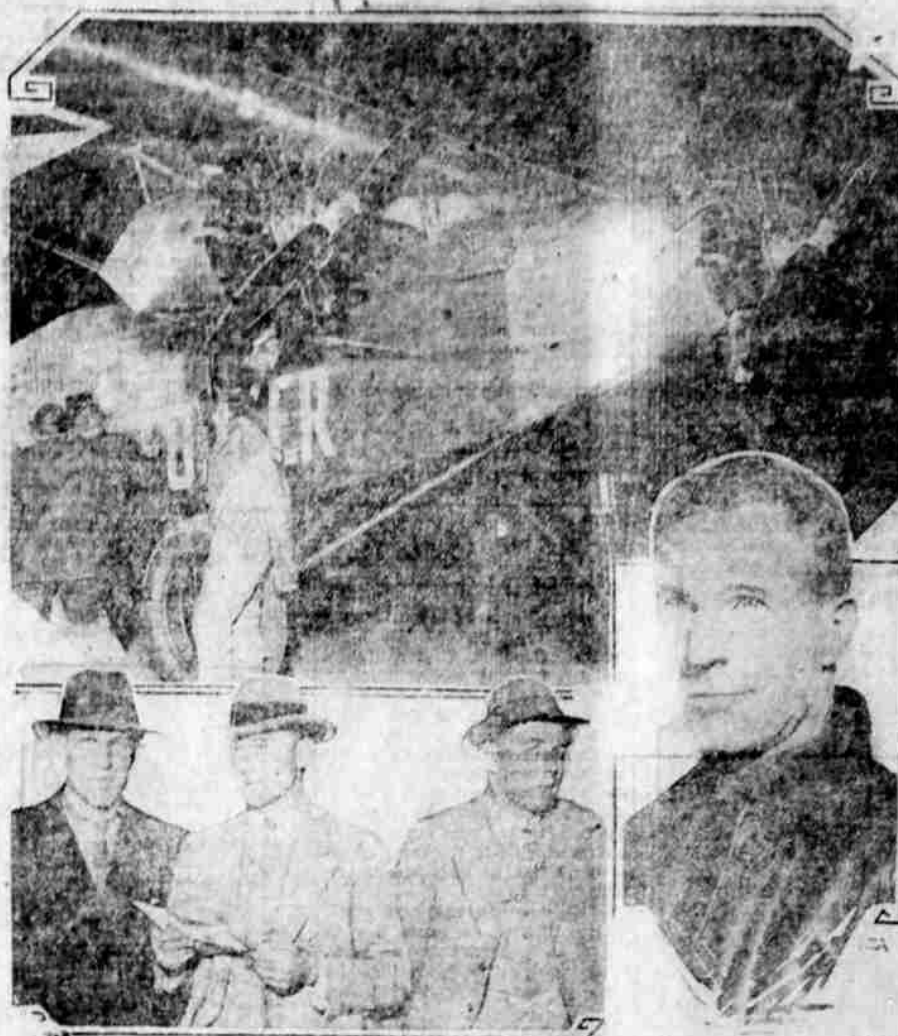

SEASON OPENED FOR TRAPPING

Close on the heels of the closing of pheasant and quail season in Klamath comes the opening today of quail season in Siskiyou county and of trapping season in Klamath county.

The trapping season which legalizes commercial trapping will remain open for four months. Altogether the occupation is not as important as in former days, there are still a number of woodmen who seek a livelihood during fall and winter seasons in trapping fur bearing animals.

Principal fur bearing animals sought after in the Klamath basin include minks, martin and fishers.

The quail season in California includes only Siskiyou county. Season is open from November 1 to December 1. The boundary lines of Siskiyou and Modoc counties is more or less bisected by the lake. Thus the west side of the lake is open to quail shooting but not the east side.

Quail season in Modoc county opens December 1 and lasts until January 1.

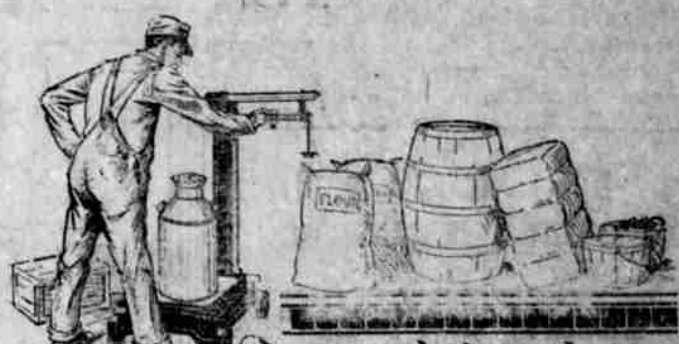
