Basin Netted Gems Featured On All Lines of Railroad Company

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7. Klamath Falls' second annual potato show is being boosted on all Southern Pacific trains over the Shasta Route, according to J. M. Scott, assistant passenger traffic manager for the company. Several thousand specially illustrated dining car menus have been prepared and distributed by the company on all dining cars on the Shasta Route. Under a photograph containing several sacks of Klamath Falls netted gems topped by a smiling youngster is the following information: "Klamath Netted Gem potatoes will be the feature of the Second Annual Potato Show at Klamath Falls, Oregon, November 8, 9, 10. Klamath potatoes are in demand because of their unusually high quality. Ideal soils, climate, the best of seed, and careful grading are bringing big returns to Klamath farmers whose potatoes top the market year in and year out. "A hot buttered delicious Klamath baked potato is long remembered. Klamath potato acreage has been doubled every year for the past four years. There is every indication that Klamath farmers will repeat this increase during the coming year."

BESTIAL "APE" HUMAN STRIKES

PORTLAND, Nov. 7. (AP)—With at least 10 complaints from frightened women in the Sellwood and Holgate moorage districts against an "ape man," a fantastically bent and animalish human whom police chased to no avail Saturday night, a determined hunt was under way today. Sighted, described and chased last week by Chris Johnson, caretaker at Holgate moorage, after the "apparition" had chased several women residents, complaints took a more definite form when three night operators, going off duty at 10 p. m. at the Sellwood telephone exchange, told of being chased.

(Continued from page 1) sent by airplane. A plane landed food and medical supplies in Montpelier. Much attention was devoted today to the prevention of disease in the flooded areas. Basements were being cleared of mud and water-soaked rubbish, residents were warned to boil their drinking water and premises were being disinfected.

Railroad service had been restored on some lines in western Massachusetts and southern and central New Hampshire but was still badly disrupted because of the scores of bridges swept away and the innumerable washouts and landslides.

In Lowell, Mass., and other places many mills were shut down because of the high water which had flooded their power plants.

Refugees were cared for in the homes of neighbors and in public buildings.

Hartford and other Connecticut cities along the Connecticut valley were feeling the brunt of the flood as it worked its way south and east.

Tales of heroism came from all the devastated areas.

All means of reaching the outside world was cut off when the bridge across the Winooki river was carried away on the first day of the flood.

Only yesterday persons in the outskirts of Waterbury noticed men waving their coats on the other shore. The stream is fully 200 feet wide and of treacherous swiftness but with megaphones the plight of the residents of the little communities largely the families of workers of the talc mines, it was learned.

Rescue Work Starts. Rescue work was begun at once. With much difficulty a light line was floated across the river, a heavier one was pulled over and with a steel cable was stretched from one side to the other. Lloyd Squire, assistant editor of the Waterbury Record, volunteered to make the perilous crossing and hand over hand he swung himself above the swirling waters. He reached
