



## SPLIT SEASON IN COAST LEAGUE WILL BE TRIED

Winners of Each Half to Play Series at End to Determine Winner

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8. (AP)—Directors of the Pacific Coast Baseball League meeting in their annual session here yesterday adopted a split season to be put into effect next year.

Each season will be of 13 weeks, with one addition week split. Winners of the first season will meet the champions of the second season for the pennant in the 27th week.

This is the first time in the history of class AA baseball that a split season has been adopted.

The vote was 4 to 2. President Wm. McCarthy of San Francisco Mission Springs, swinging to the side of the split season proponents after considerable discussion. The San Francisco Seals and the Oakland club held out against adoption of the proposed plan. The season will open April 3. The entire playing schedule has not yet been drawn up.

Today's meeting adjourned until January 16.

## \$20,000 Bonus May be Given Pennant Club

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8. (AP)—A \$20,000 bonus as a playing incentive probably will be put into effect in the Pacific coast league next year. Directors of the league meeting here yesterday adopted a split season of 13 weeks each and indicated that a substantial bonus will be hung up to go to the club winning the play-off.

Oscar Reichow, secretary of the Los Angeles club and one of the proponents of the split season, said that without a bonus the split season probably could not function. He declared it was virtually assured that the bonus would be voted upon favorably at the meeting of the league here next January 16.

The split season proposition was adopted yesterday by a six to two vote. The San Francisco and Oakland clubs voting against it.

## NOTED JOCKEY WEEPS AS BAN ORDER UPHeld

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 8. (AP)—The Maryland racing commission today refused to lift its ban against Earl Sande, famous jockey, whom that body deprived of his license for alleged fool riding at Pimlico last Friday. The commission said the order of suspension would be continued indefinitely but that it would not be made permanent.

## N. Y. Halfback May Break Red Grange's Mark

NEW YORK, Nov. 8. (UP)—With three games to go, "Ten yards" Brantje, line cracking ace of the New York University, is bent on smashing the ground gaining record Red Grange set in 1923.

In seven games this season, statisticians discovered, Brantje has plunged through opposing forward walls for a total of 1181 yards for an average of 7.35 yards per plunge. He has clocked off 3.25 yards for each minute of play and has yet to be stopped for "no gain."

Back in 1923, when the Galloping Ghost of the Illinois backfield was performing in wonder fashion, experts set his seasonal gain at 1250 yards. Last Saturday Brantje had run ahead 167 yards in 49 minutes of play, including one dash of 30 yards.

## Grange Holds Ice Toting is Poor Practice

NEW YORK, Nov. 8. (AP)—Red Grange is to tote no more ice.

"The Wheaton ice man," who popularized the business as an exercise for half backs on vacation, declared today he believed this practice caused rheumatism. "Yes sir," said Red. "That cold water on your shoulders doesn't do anybody any good. I know some old time ice toters back home and it's ruined 'em. I'm going to stick to shoveling cement and playing golf like I did last summer."

## ANNUAL CLASH OF IRISH AND ARMY SATURDAY

Cadets Out for Scalp of Flanagan Whose Run Beat Them Last Year

NEW YORK, Nov. 8. (UP)—The annual Notre Dame-Army football game takes place Saturday at the Yankee Stadium and only the Ka-Ping-tion name of New Haven outwits this battle between the Irish and Cadets.

It will be the fourteenth clash between Notre Dame and the Army—a series started in 1913 with only one break during the war year of 1918.

Notre Dame has won nine games, Army three and one was a tie.

As always, K. K. Rockne will bring a thundering herd of home-state once again how hard, driving, slashing football should be played.

The Irish were speeding toward a claim to the national football championship until they hit a snag in the Minnesota team last week and were held to a 7-7 tie. Notre Dame beat the Navy, 13-6, Georgia Tech, 26-7, Indiana, 19-2, Detroit, 20-0, and Case, 28-7.

Great Assortment. Rockne has an assortment of high-class players capable of playing any type of football—the second team is about as good as the first and each is fitted to its own special position. The reserves are plentiful and good.

The army is not weak in spite of a 10-6 loss at the hands of the Yale eleven. The Cadets have beaten Boston University, Detroit, Marquette, Davis-Ellins, Bucknell and Franklin and Marshall, but aside from the Yale game, the Army team has not had a real test.

Army Is Comer. There is a general feeling in eastern football circles that the Army veterans had not reached their peak in the Yale game and that they have been coming on fast since that defeat and will face Notre Dame this week a far superior combination to the one which bowed to Old Eli. Captain Harry Wilson, Cagle, Merrill, Sprague, Harbold, and the other Army veterans will be primed for Notre Dame as they never have been for any rival except the Navy.

Laying For Christy. Christy Flanagan flicked dust in the eyes of practically this same bunch of Army players last year when he raced 65 yards for a touchdown and beat the Army, 7 to 0. And the Army will be out to stop Christy and Notre Dame and avenge the 1926 defeat.

All seats have been sold for weeks and a capacity crowd of 75,000 will see the game.

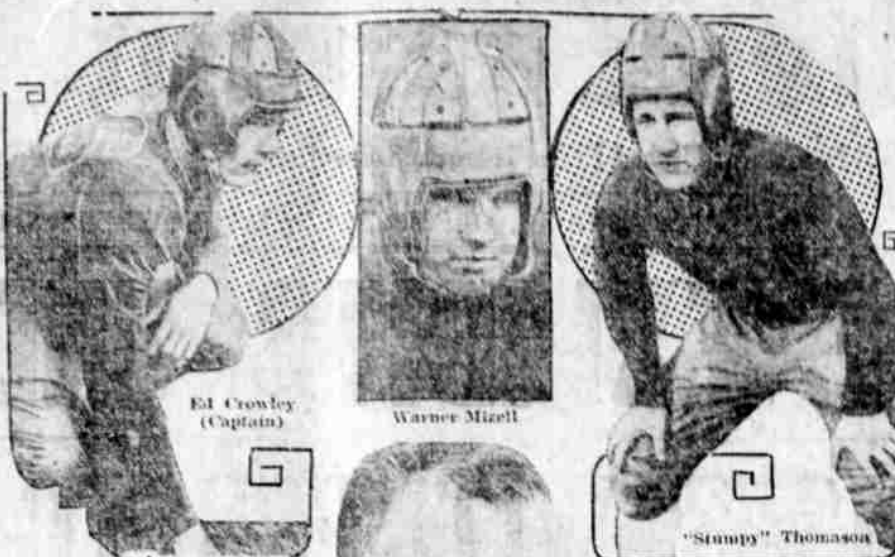


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## Are Seeking Title in Dixie

## STEVE, ROSIE KIDNAPERS ARE CHARGED AGAIN

Two Names Identified With Mrs. McPherson Case Appear in Court

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 8. (UP)—"Steve" and "Rosie," who gained international fame as the alleged kidnapers of Almeda Semple McPherson, woman evangelist, indirectly were charged with two more victims in divorce court here today.

The mysterious pair, who purportedly held Mrs. McPherson a prisoner in a Mexican desert shack in May, 1926, were in effect blamed for the disappearance of Harry Melosh and Babe Daniels a year ago.

Mrs. Katherine Melosh was granted a divorce after she told the court the story of how her husband dropped from sight.

Melosh and Miss Daniels, both of whom figured heavily in the court action that followed Mrs. McPherson's disappearance, left for the desert country of Northern Mexico a year ago, Mrs. Melosh testified.
