Again Gaghagen flared up. "Such things as this should be in writing," he told the council. "The sooner this council gets down to business principles and business methods, the easier it will be to transact municipal affairs."

Gaghagen ignored the council's criticism. D. V. Kurkendall, attorney, representing the Northern lines, supplied the need of a petition by making an oral request for permission to cross south Sixth. He said that a written request would be formally submitted later.

There was not a dissenting vote on the crossing issue. It was plainly evident that the council's collective mind had been made up prior to the meeting.

Specific Regulation
The resolution specified that the crossing should be flush with the street and no obstruction; that the railroad company would replace pavement torn up; that the railroad company would be responsible for the street alongside the crossing grade be changed; that the crossing shall be in use only between 7 p. m. and 6 a. m. and that at no time would cars be allowed to remain in the mid-

dle of the street obstructing traffic; that nothing shall restrain the city from putting in conduits, sewers and other municipal improvements; and that if the crossing is abandoned the railroad company would be obligated to restore the street to its original state.
