GIRL HE LEFT BEHIND FILES MAJOR CHARGE

Jump to Big Leagues May End Sadly for Chalmers Cissel

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 10. (AP)—Chalmers Cissel, riding from the army toward the big leagues at a speed with few precedents in diamond records, faced a criminal court detour today.

A felony indictment based on the story of a 20-year-old telephone operator in Des Moines, Iowa, led to his arrest at his home here last night. He is being held without bond for Iowa officers.

Last year Cissel was a soldier at Fort Des Moines. He stepped from khaki to the uniform of a Des Moines Western League ball player. His brilliance at short-stop caught the eye of scouts and he was sold to Portland of the Pacific Coast League for \$10,000 and several players.

In Indictment. Almost at the same time last week that the Chicago White Sox announced they had purchased Cissel from Portland for \$125,000, a Des Moines grand jury returned an indictment against him, charging seduction.

The indictment was based on the telephone operator's story that Cissel had not kept a promise to marry her. She purchased a trousseau, she said, and waited for him to join her in Des Moines at the end of the baseball season. When he failed to arrive, she complained to prosecuting officers.

DES MOINES, Iowa, Nov. 10. (AP)—Chalmers William Cissel, 23-year-old Des Moines youth, will be returned to Des Moines to face a charge of seduction, following his arrest last night in St. Louis.

He was indicted here last week on charges brought by Bernice Ryner, 20-year-old telephone operator, and his arrest at St. Louis followed a search that had extended from the Pacific coast to the Mississippi river. Sheriff Park Findley expected to send for the diamond star today.

Child Is Born. In August Cissel wrote that he would come to Des Moines but did not.

Miss Ryner gave birth to a baby boy several weeks ago, after which she asked county authorities to take action against Cissel.

Michigan Will Attempt Task Of Skinning Navy Grid Team

CHICAGO, Nov. 10. (AP)—Michigan's traditional maize and blue will be reinforced with flamboyant orange when its football team attempts to sink the Navy at Ann Arbor Saturday.

Last year the middie turned tables on the crusading Wolverines at Annapolis 10 to 0 and the defeat was partially blamed on the similarity of uniforms, which caused considerable confusion. But Saturday, Michigan players will wear orange painted helmets to distinguish who's who.

The "Big" game of the big ten will be played at Ann Arbor with Illinois defending a clean record against Chicago, looking for victory after a pair of conference defeats.

Chicago expects to have full strength available, the casualties of the Michigan game having recovered from injuries which were found not as serious as at first indicated. Ken Rose, captain and line mauler, will oppose Bob Reisch, Illinois' all-conference center.

While the Illinois-Chicago affair is the only one which has any bearing on the big ten championship there are two traditional battles on the schedule. Wisconsin and Iowa meet in the annual Badger homecoming at Madison and Indiana invades Northwestern.

Minnesota, Purdue, and Ohio state engage foes outside of the conference. Drake, Franklin and Denison respectively.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10. (AP)—The job of filling Bruce Caldwell's mud-encrusted football shoes and the big blue jersey numbered 48, harried Tad Jones today in his task of preparing Yale for the 52nd meeting with Princeton at New Haven Saturday.

Two candidates stood out in the Ell squad—John Garvey, an understudy of the disqualified ace all season, and Bill Hammersley, crack kicker and passing threat. For the most part, Jones seeks a man to have the forward passes that have gained consistently all season and to puzzle the defense by ability to run, pass or kick from punt formation.
