

STRANGE DEATH TO BE PROBED

Coroner's Office Orders Exhumation of Body of Wealthy Woman

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 18. (UP)—In an attempt to discover whether poison figured in the death the coroner's office today ordered the exhumation of the ashes of a cremated woman—the first instance of its kind in the history of Los Angeles county.

The action was outlined when a court order was obtained which prevented the shipment of the ashes of Mrs. Elizabeth Marion Steele Hollenbeck Wall to her former home in Mont Clair, N. J. Mrs. Wall died last October leaving an estate valued at \$500,000.

Peculiar provisions of Mrs. Wall's will and unexplained circumstances surrounding her death formed the basis for the court order.

Mrs. Wall, past 50, died suddenly at her home here October 16. Exhaustive tests failed to determine the cause of her death although the body was held by the coroner's office for 16 days.

She left practically her entire fortune to her husband, Wesley Wall, 25, to whom she had been married but a short time.

When the body was returned to the young widower, he immediately had it cremated, according to the coroner's office. Shortly thereafter her will was filed for probate.

Three paragraphs of the document were devoted to the establishment of a \$10,000 maintenance fund for her dog, "Thor," a Great Dane. Wall was made custodian of the dog.

Another paragraph ordered that her body be cremated immediately after death. She asked that no funeral services be held.

Young Wall has been unable to throw any light upon his wife's death, the coroner's office said.

burning freighter, which went on the rocks near San Francisco some time ago and was towed here for scrapping.

From a hospital operating table where he awaited treatment for his injuries, Raymond Carson said the blast shook the ship "like a terrier shakes a rat."

Lucky Escape.
"From the way that boat rocked, I don't see how any of us got away," Carson said.

Like the explosion in Pittsburgh last Monday when more than a score of persons were killed, acetylene torch and gas tank were believed the cause of today's blast.

"I was working amidship with an acetylene torch preparing to cut loose some stuff," said Carson, "when something happened. I don't know what it was, there was a big roar and I was thrown to the deck."

"Whatever it was, it cut loose down in the bunkers beneath me."

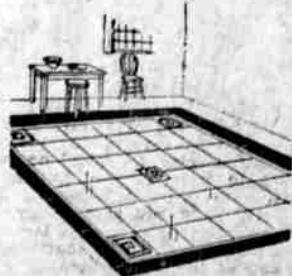
