LONGMONT, Colo., Nov. 21. (AP)—Six striking coal miners

who were shot this morning by state police are dying in the Longmont hospital. Doctors said their injuries were so serious that there was little hope they could live more than a short time. Thirteen other strikers are in the hospital receiving treatment for wounds received in the battle with state officers at the Columbine mine this morning.

DENVER, Nov. 21. (AP)—Responsibility for the deaths of two men killed at the Columbine mine this morning rests squarely on the strikers themselves, Governor W. H. Adams said today.

Martial law authorized in the Colorado coal strike zone by Governor W. H. Adams this morning will not go into effect until Colonel Paul P. Newton, adjutant general of the state, decides that it is necessary.
