

OREGON LOSES TO WASHINGTON

HUSKIES PUSH OVER SCORE IN FOURTH PERIOD

Webfooters Play Remarkable Game; Have Opponents in Trouble

SEATTLE, Nov. 25. (AP) — The Oregon Webfooters ran into the University of Washington Huskies yesterday and although rated far below the powerful Washington team, battled their opponents to a standstill for the greater part of the game and lost only in the last six minutes of play when the Huskies punched across one more touchdown. The try for extra point was successful and the game ended with the score 7 to 0.

In the closing minutes of the game Coach McEwan was forced to make many replacements as Oregon players were fad or carried from the field unable to withstand the terrific pounding of the Husky battering ram attack.

In the third period only a fumble prevented the Webfooters from getting a touchdown. Wood, standing in midfield, hurried a thirty yard pass to Wetzel, who was in the clear. Wetzel shared the pass but as he turned toward the goal line the ball slipped from his fingers and the one great opportunity was gone. The game was witnessed by a crowd of 20,000.

P. O. EMPLOYEES HAVE HARD DAY

Ashland played an aerial game throughout, and nearly every play was a forward pass.

Geese Flying Back and Forth Between Tule Lake and Lower Klamath Lake; Ducks are Cagy

Roads which could just barely be negotiated and that's all, were met yesterday by many hunters who chose Tule lake as the location of their Thanksgiving celebration.

The further down the west side road the cars proceeded, the poorer the roads—particularly the lower road which is closer to the edge of the marsh.

Thousands of geese are now plying back and forth between Tule and Lower Klamath lake, according to hunters. As the afternoon drew to a close scores of flocks sailed over the high ridge of mountain which divide the two big basins and dropped down into Tule lake for the night.

Whether ceaseless bombardment in Tule lake or better feeding conditions in lower Klamath lake is the cause of the change in their habits is not known.

Ducks Cagy. As the hunting season grows older and as the number of hunters on the great Tule basin increase, the ducks become canny. To see tens of thousands of birds flying low just out of range, was the experience of nearly every hunter yesterday.

The birds have learned what a blind is. Hunters report that ducks went their way in and out, avoiding blinds during a flight across the lake, much the same as an automobile will dodge back and forth through heavy traffic.

Small Blind. It has come to the point where the wise hunter makes his blind as small as possible. Some hunters have taken to laying flat on their back on little islands, securing the use of tumble weed as protection.

Although it is difficult to judge, many experienced Tule lake hunters believe that there are not as many birds in the great 80,000 acre basin this year as last or the year before. Certainly there are fewer geese and the ducks do not appear to be as numerous.

That most speckled breasted geese are still in the far north awaiting the arrival of a wintry blast from the far north to send them winging for the warmer lands of the south, is the general belief.

O. S. C. STAR BACK HAS COLD

Hospital Authorities State That George Scott Can Play

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 25. (A. P.)—George Scott, star halfback of the Oregon State Agricultural college football team, was reported recovering rapidly today from a cold which threatened to keep him out of the game Saturday at Portland with Carnegie Tech. At the hospital today it was denied that he was suffering from pneumonia and it was stated that he was placed there merely as a precaution to keep his cold from becoming more serious.

GRID TITLE OF PORTLAND WON BY GRANT HIGH

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 25. (A. P.)—Grant high school yesterday won the Portland interscholastic football championship by defeating Washington high 8 to 0 before a crowd of ten thousand spectators.

The lone touchdown came in the fourth period when Tarbell, Grant end, recovered a Washington fumble on the latter's three-yard line and legged across the goal line. The try for point failed.

Zuppke Calls Reitsch Star of Illinois Team

Compares Present Illinois Center With Famous All-America Chapman

Coach Bob Zuppke has a great team at Illinois this year. It's going to be even better next season. There are a lot of sophomores on the eleven. A year's experience under their belt is going to give them added power.

Once upon a time "Red" Grange hogged the Illinois spotlight. Grange's great feats dwarfed the brilliant work of the line that was making them possible.

When Grange made his exit, "Frosty" Peters made his entrance. The team gave way to the fireman in the battle for publicity. Peters got plenty of

Reitsch who has been the victim of widespread stories to the effect that Illinois has a "starless" team.

Zuppke characterized Reitsch, practically unanimous all-conference center last season, as a great player and a great leader, the most aggressive captain Illinois has had since Ralph "Stoic" Chapman, first Illini All-America and one of the great heroes of the World War, who captained the 1914 eleven, Zuppke's first conference championship team.

Reitsch is playing his third year at the pivot and in his second year is playing the best game of his career, snapping the ball accurately for the intricate plays of Zuppke-coached backs, making tackles all over the field and encouraging his men by his example and his personality.

Zuppke attributes a large measure of the success of the 1927 Illinois team to the playing and leadership of Captain Reitsch and resents the insinuation that the Illinois team is "starless" when he believes the skipper of the crew is the leading candidate for this All-American honors.
