

GEORGIA AND PITTSBURG BEST TEAMS IN U. S.

Two Grid Leaders to Be Under Fire Again Before Season's End

NEW YORK, Nov. 28. (AP)—The climax of college football's spectacular season, now awaiting only the final returns from a few sectors of the south and west, leaves the national championship situation still undecided, but with the race narrowed down. In the opinion of most unbiased observers, to a contest between the Bulldogs of Georgia and the Panthers of Pittsburgh.

These two have their rivals and challengers for sectional as well as national honors but few critics question that, for the present at least, they have as substantial a claim as any outfit to the main laurel wreaths.

The title hopes of each now are centered about forthcoming engagements that will determine their final rating. Georgia, with nine successive victories to its credit and Yale among its victims, plays Georgia Tech in the classic of the south at Atlanta this Saturday. Pittsburgh, triumphant in eight games and tied only by Washington and Jefferson, journeys to the far west for the tournament of roses game on January 2 with Leland Stanford, one of the contenders for the Pacific Coast conference crown.

The outcome of these battles may not end the dispute but they at least will help to clear the title atmosphere.

There are at least a half dozen other teams whose records cannot be overlooked when the final rating is posted, even though their achievements may not quite match those of Georgia and Pittsburgh.

Yale Defeated

Yale men dispute Pittsburgh's claim to the eastern peak but Yale's defeat by Georgia eliminates it from the national picture. Washington and Jefferson would have remained at Pitt's side but for another tie with West Virginia on the same day that the Panthers were crushing Penn State.

Loses Eight Games in Eight Years

That is Knute Rockne's Great Record As Coach of Notre Dame Teams

Knute Rockne is one of the most interesting figures in the sport world.

If there is any one who doesn't have the lowdown on this fellow Rockne, he is the football coach at Notre Dame.

In all probability, Mr. Knute Rockne is one of the very few, if not the only coach, who doesn't have to worry from year to year as to his football berth.

The reason: Knute Rockne always delivers, no matter how many stars he may lose from year to year. Somehow, among the freshmen class he always seems to have in reserve, players just as good.

This is Rockne's eleventh year at Notre Dame. At the close of the present season, teams coached by him will have played in more than 100 games under the Notre Dame colors.

Knute Rockne is a product of Notre Dame. He learned his football under Coach Jess Harper. On his graduation he assisted Harper for a year or two and when Harper retired, he recommended the naming of Rockne as head coach.

It was in 1917 that the name of Rockne first broke into the headlines. He was then a star player. It was that year that the forward pass combination of Dorais at quarter to Rockne at end smothered a great Army team 35-13 and was the start of an amazing string of victories over the West Pointers. Rockne was the captain of that team as well as an outstanding star.

In 1917 he took over the coaching reins. His captain that year was Jimmy Uhlman, now head coach at Purdue, the man who treated Harvard to a real surprise this year by triumphing the Crimson, 19-0.

In the ten years that Rockne has coached at Notre Dame, prior

10 years that he has spent at Notre Dame prior to the present season. He has hopes of going through 1927, undefeated, bringing the string of wins to 93.

CHILOQUIN, Ore., Nov. 28.—There will be a special city election tomorrow for the purpose of voting on the proposed increase in the city budget for next year which was recently made up by the budget committee. The election will be held in the Chiloquin Plumbing company offices.

Taxpayers and others affected may see the original estimates at the office of the city recorder.

The assessed valuation of the city has been more than doubled over last year. Therefore while the amount of money to be raised is higher than last year it will be spread out over \$250,000 worth of property as against \$100,000 for last year.
