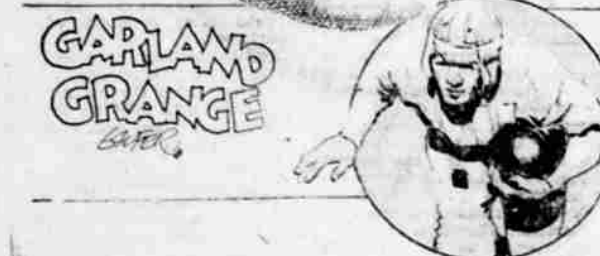

Illinois Gives Cheers for "Pinky" Grange Now

"Red" Grange, the "Galloping Ghost" of other days in Big Ten circles, has finally been vindicated.

When Illinois beat Michigan recently by the score of 14-9, in which the play of "Pinky" Grange, younger brother of "Red," featured, a prediction made three years ago came true.

"I have a younger brother Garland who is as good if not a better player than I am." That was "Red's" modest college yell any time the critics raved over any of his many superlative performances.

For two seasons "Pinky" was a complete "bust" in his attempt to live up to the famed deeds of his illustrious brother. A serious injury, suffered early in his sophomore year, put him out of the running before the season had gotten under way and eventually caused his retirement from college for the year.

The following season "Red" Grange himself unconsciously was the cause of Brother "Pinky" making the grade and all because good-hearted "Red" wanted Brother "Pinky" to have some of the many luxuries the two had often cherished but probably never expected to have.

Quitting Illinois to enter professional football, because no sane person could refuse the fancy sum that was guaranteed him, "Red" Grange, a poor boy, almost overnight became wealthy.

On top of this came more money as the result of a highly successful college movie in which he starred.

I am told by a very close friend of "Red's" that one of the very first things he did after purchasing a home for the family was to buy a snappy red roadster and a "spiffy" racoon coat for Brother "Pinky."

In his travels, Grange had discovered those two things were prized assets, the liberal advantages of a college education, for the sons of the pampered rich.

What could be more natural than for "Red" Grange to use his newly-acquired wealth on his "kid" brother. Real sentiment there. However "Red" unknowingly for a time spoiled a potentially great football player.

An open roadster, a racoon coat, the wide open spaces of Illinois and a fat pocketbook, were not conducive to gridiron thoughts, strenuous training and going early to bed. There was no desire to return to Illinois and study.

Very often a year's experience in getting real contact with the world helps a lot. I am told that when "Pinky" Grange returned to Illinois this fall, he came with a seriousness about his work that was previously lacking and at once began to rise to the heights.

Brother "Red" had prophesied. In the two games that I have seen "Pinky" Grange in action, he fails to do only one thing as well as "Red," carry the ball. As an end he hasn't the opportunities that his brother had. He is

"The greatest satisfaction I ever got out of any football game was in 'Pinky's' showing against Michigan," is the way "Red" tells the story of his pride in the achievements of the younger Grange.

"Pinky's" hair is sure enough red. He is more entitled to the nickname given his brother, but must take the moniker of "Pinky" to distinguish between the two.

The Old College Spirit.

"Well, I gave it the old college try."

That is a term often used in big league baseball, when some player keeps on going after a fly ball, usually in foul territory, with the odds about 10-1 he would never reach it.

Teammates of such a player often beat him to it by shouting in unison, with the thought of humor uppermost:

"Well, kid, you certainly gave it the old college try," as he falls short of making the catch.

On other occasions, when some player does something that a professional player might not ordinarily attempt, such as colliding with a fielder who had the ball ready to touch him out, in the hope that he might make him drop the ball, regardless of the danger he was courting, someone is safe to say, often ironically, if the speaker happens to be one of the players in the field.

"That's the old college spirit."

In professional circles, there is a realization that there is a difference, but the treatment of the situation is more or less from the humorous angle.

Lived Up To Agreement.

Within the past week or so, we have seen a number of concrete examples of the college spirit and what it means.

Perhaps the most notable was the sportsmanlike attitude of Princeton relative to the status of Bruce Caldwell.

By all means let Caldwell play," was Princeton's answer to Yale's action in declaring Caldwell ineligible, because as a freshman at Brown he had played two games of football.

That was typical spirit of old Nassau. I have always had the greatest admiration for Princeton, but the attitude toward Caldwell greatly increased that feeling.

The transfer rule adopted by Yale, Princeton and Harvard, really had no bearing on a case

like Caldwell's. However, since it did apply in a technical sense, Yale ruled its stand should be earned.

That was the old college spirit that Princeton displayed when it urged that Bruce Caldwell be permitted to appear in the Yale lineup.

Gave Opponents a Rest.

The Georgetown-Lafayette game of a recent date offered a chance for Captain Claude Briggs to display his sportsmanship, and he rose to the occasion in true All-America style.

Georgetown ran rough-shod over Lafayette, winning 27-2, in the second period, while still having a chance, Lafayette, after a drive of 40 yards, had one of its players injured. About to take him out, Captain Cothran of Lafayette discovered he had gone the limit.

"I can't afford the penalty for excessive time out," he told the referee and ordered play to resume.

Captain Briggs of Georgetown overheard him and finding he still had one more time out for his team, said:

"I'll take time out for Lafayette. Charge it to Georgetown."

That was more than a mere gesture on the part of the Georgetown captain, it was the old college spirit and it rang true.

A Way To Take Defeat.

Another interesting demonstration of the spirit that pervades the ranks of our colleges, was the reply of the University of California, through the president of its student body, to the head of the University of Southern California undergraduates, after
