MEDFORD MAY PLAY MILTON-FREEWATER HIGH

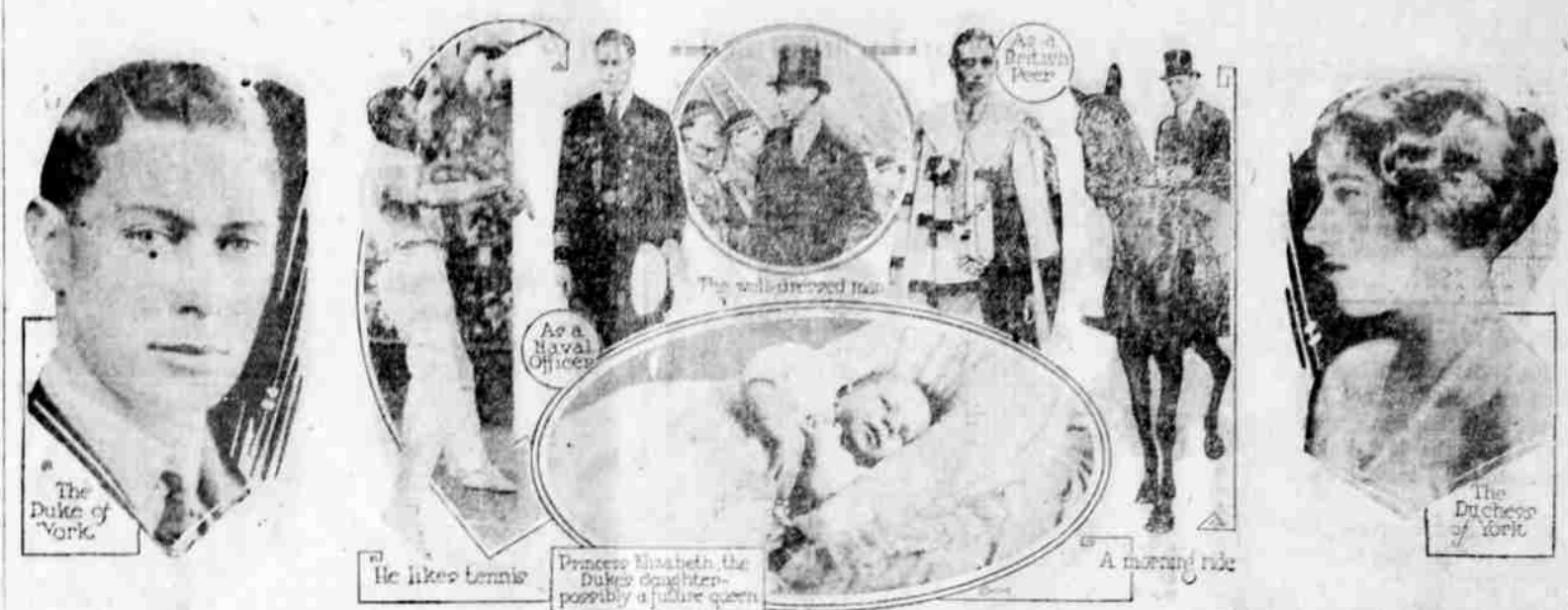

A Throne for Wales' Brother?

Duke of York, Popular and Democratic, Due to Become King of England if Edward Windsor Remains a Bachelor

THESE PEOPLE MAY BE GREAT BRITAIN'S NEXT "ROYAL FAMILY"

LONDON, Nov. 29.—The British public is just beginning to wake up to the fact that the second son of King George may some day be the most important man in the kingdom.

All of which is only another way of saying that Albert, Duke of York, has a chance of being elevated to the throne of England.

And a chubby, roly-poly baby girl, the tiny Princess Elizabeth, only child of the duke, may be destined to reign as England's queen.

In court circles these events have been discussed for some time. It has only been recently, however, that the public at large has begun to think of them.

Wales Stays Single.
Here is the situation that brings the likable Duke of York into the limelight:

The Prince of Wales, direct heir to the throne, is unmarried. Furthermore, he has reached the age of 33 and shows no intention whatever of marrying and providing himself with an heir. Thus, if he remains single throughout

his life, as now seems very possible, he will have, when he becomes king, no son or daughter to inherit the crown on his death. In such a case the Duke of York would be next in line of royal succession. Should Wales die childless, his brother Albert would become king.

This, of course, would make the eldest male child of the Duke of York the next heir to the throne. But the Duke of York's only child is a girl, the wee Princess above mentioned. If, at the time of her father's death, she had no brothers, she would become queen.

Accordingly, the British public is beginning to pay more attention to the coming and goings of the Duke of York.

What sort of chap is he, anyway, this younger brother of the famous Wales?
To begin with, it is safe to say that he would be every bit as popular as Wales if he were as well known. He is a modest, rather shy chap of 31, likable in the extreme, fully aware of the responsibilities that are his and, like Wales, thoroughly democratic and unassuming.

Doubtless it will surprise most people to learn it, but York is considered the best-dressed prince in England. His sartorial get-up is chosen with even more care than that of Wales, and his taste in clothes runs to some what gayer patterns and cuts.

The responsibilities of his position have made him studious and thorough. He is deeply interested in labor matters, is president of the Industrial Welfare Society and is constantly working to bring about a better understanding between employers and workers. He is forever studying factory conditions at first hand; many a factory superintendent has learned that the duke likes to drop in unexpectedly at a manufacturing plant and make a thorough tour of inspection.

He is fully as ardent a sportsman as the Prince of Wales, too. He plays an excellent game of tennis, is a very fair golfer and while in the navy distinguished himself as a distance runner. In addition he is rated a good cricketer, and in his youth he played a good game of football.

The duke has a very respect-

able war record. Unlike the Prince of Wales, he was not kept forever secluded behind the lines; at the battle of Jutland he was under fire on the battleship Collingwood, and later he was transferred to the air force, making a number of flights in France.

At present the duke holds the rank of commander in the navy and captain in the royal air force. Military men will tell you that these titles were earned, too, and not handed him on a silver platter. The duke went through the regular British naval training school just like any other British youth, and served a long apprenticeship afloat.

The duke has lately devoted considerable time to a novel establishment of his own invention—a summer camp for boys in Kent. At this camp sons of factory hands mingle annually for fortnightly periods, with the duke in attendance as general supervisor. This camp is in line with his attempts to promote better understanding between England's rather widely-separated upper and lower classes.

Constant activity marks the

duke's daily life. He once played a widely heralded game of golf with Frank Hodges, well known mine union leader. On another occasion he was photographed piloting a locomotive into Euston station, London. He also is kept busy with ceremonial matters, representing his nation at many royal functions and state ceremonies throughout Europe.

From Glamis Castle.
The duke's wife, Princess Elizabeth, is charming and popular. She was born Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, and the home of her titled family is the famous Glamis castle, where Shakespeare's Macbeth started on his bloody career. She is in the words of Queen Mary, "not one of these modern girls, thank heaven!" and her marriage to the duke four years ago, was heralded throughout the kingdom as a love match, pure and simple.

Incidentally, it is worth noting that the Prince of Wales always addresses her as "Queen Elizabeth"—as though he knew that she would some day be queen in sober fact.

PUG SUSPENDED BY COMMISSION

NEW YORK, Nov. 29. (AP)—Ray Taylor of Torre Haute, Ind., generally recognized as world's bantamweight champion, was suspended indefinitely today by the New York state athletic commission for withdrawing from a scheduled fight next Thursday with Tony Cazoneri. Taylor reported and injured hand, but suspension in such cases is required by the commission's rules regardless of the circumstances.

Before the dinner, Captain Stanyon said it was planned to send two letters to six million voters next year, at an estimated cost of ten cents per voter. He figured that from \$2,700,000 to \$3,000,000 would be needed in the next four years. He said the association would seek a national referendum plank in the platform of the republican and democratic parties on the theory that it was the duty of political parties to find out what the voters wanted. If the national parties refused to decrease or operate such a plank in their platforms, a movement will be made for referenda in the several states.

Former Senator Wadsworth, who was defeated for reelection by Robert F. Wagner, democrat, was outspoken before the dinner, that he would be a candidate for delegate at large at the next national republican convention and that he hoped the convention would meet the prohibition issue squarely.
