



MEDFORD GRID TEAM TO MEET M'LOUGHLIN HI

Milton-Freewater School to Be Played for State Championship

MEDFORD, Ore., Nov. 30. (A. P.)—The Medford high school football team leaves here tonight to play the McLaughlin high school of Milton-Freewater, Saturday, December 3, for the mythical state championship outside of Portland. The sanction for the game was given last night by the state board of athletics. The Medford team offers to play the Tillamook high school, or any other logical contender, the state board may designate, Saturday, December 10. If it wins next Saturday's game, the December 10th game to be played in this city. The Medford team will not play in Portland, except to meet Grant high school. The following men will make the trip: Bernard Hughes, center; John Hughes, Prock and Staher, guards; Demmer, Morgan and Oscar Newlin, tackles; Biden, McDonald and Bowerman, ends; Carnott, Swanson and Walker, quarterbacks; Moore, Herman Newlin, Fredericks, halfbacks; Day and Harrell, fullbacks. The line averages 185 pounds and the backfield 165 pounds. The team ranges from Eddie Demmer, six feet 4 inches, 227 pounds, to Bernie Harrell, four feet 6 inches, 155 pounds. In five years of interscholastic playing Medford has been defeated but once, and has won 47 games in a row, under Coach Frank Callison. The Medford team will arrive in Walla Walla Thursday evening and stay in that city until Saturday morning.

RUPERT HUGHES IS CONDEMNED

CHICAGO, Nov. 30. (A. P.)—Rupert Hughes, the writer, came in for condemnation at today's session of the William McDougall school trial, which progressed without a defendant. Hughes was assailed by Charles Grant Miller, New York writer and head of the sex patriots league, for his reference in a historical account of George Washington, to Mount Vernon, "with its constant round of entertaining, drinking, card playing and betting, comparable to the present-day roadhouse." "I wondered what could have inspired so nasty a sneer as that," continued Miller, "and found that Hughes is an official of the Sulgrave Institute, the purpose of which is to establish Sulgrave Manor in England as the true Washington shrine."

Klamath Pugs Will Feature Medford Card

Rogue River valley tomorrow night will be given the opportunity of seeing the type of fighters that grow in Klamath when three Klamath pugilists will feature the Elks smoker card in Medford. The so-called "blonde terror," otherwise known as Billy Austin, formerly of Tacoma, will fight Jack O'Grady in the main event. Mike Daly, whose series of sensational victories in Klamath have made him a drawing card, meets "Young" King in the semi-main event. Daly in his last two fights knocked out Wilbur Harrington and Billy Huff, both Indians. Jimmy Moore, another popular Klamath fighter will fight in the special event. "Klamath fighters created such a sensation in a boxing card at Ashland recently, that Medford has secured their services for tomorrow night," Glen Le Baron, Klamath Falls matchmaker, said today.

SHORTER ROUTE BETWEEN TOWNS BEING PUSHED

SALEM, Nov. 30. (A. SEATTLE, Nov. 30. (A. P.)—Coach Enoch Hagshaw and 23 University of Washington football players will leave here tonight for Los Angeles to engage the University of Southern California in the final contest of the 1927 coast conference schedule. The Huskies were put through a stiff formation drill and scrimmage yesterday and were called together this afternoon for the last home practice of the year. In Saturday's game the northwesterners will have little to lose. With the Stanford victory here early this month, the purple and gold hopes of the conference championship went glimmering. U. S. C. on the other hand has a chance to go into a tie with Stanford and Idaho for the title by a win over Washington.

Among those whom campus grid experts feel have a good chance at election are Ira Woodley, quarterback, George Burnell, halfback, Frank Riggs, end, Merrill Hazan, guard, and George Stadelman, center. Woodley, Burnell, Riggs and Hazan will all play their last year under Oregon colors in 1928. All of these players will be seniors except Stadelman, who was a sophomore this year, but who had no difficulty in making the varsity. He was considered by sports writers who saw him in action to equal in ability to Bert Hodgen, the Webfoot captain, who plays beside him at guard. Stadelman was named on several all-coast elevens.

CREDIT FOR MINNESOTA

Kaate Rockne, famous coach of Notre Dame, doesn't believe in making an alibi for defeat. Yet, I am sure, if you could get him to express an opinion as to the defeat of the Fighting Irish by the Army, he would give most of the credit to Minnesota. Why Minnesota? you ask. Well just one week previous to the game with West Point Notre Dame played a 7-7 tie with Minnesota in one of the hardest battles of the year. The game was played in cold weather, and both teams suffered severely. Despite a difficult schedule, I feel that Rockne believed he could go through the season undefeated, provided he vanquished Minnesota. Both teams put up for the game and were at top form. However, since Notre Dame met the Army on the next Saturday, it was Rockne's team that suffered most. Scoring a touchdown early in the game with Minnesota, Notre Dame held the lead until the final minutes of play, when a break of the game that earlier had given Rockne's team a scoring chance, this time fell to Minnesota, enabling the Gophers to even the count.

However, it really wasn't after the game was over that Coach Rockne of Notre Dame realized the toll that the Minnesota game had taken of his athletes.

TEAM OF GREAT POWER

The day prior to the clash between Notre Dame and the Army, when Rockne was asked his

size-up of the Minnesota eleven, he replied:

"It's a great team that really doesn't know its own power. Once Minnesota realizes its remarkable strength there will be no stopping that aggregation. It was one of the hardest played games that I have ever seen, yet always clean. When a player was tackled in that game, he knew it. When a back hit the line, the forwards were well aware of the fact. "I am sorry I scheduled so important a game with so great a team before the Army contest, because I feel that my players gave all they had in that contest and may suffer for it later. "Regardless, I still believe we are good enough to defeat West Point, although the margin may be very close."

Rockne, who is seldom wrong in a football way, had poor dope, for the Army beat his great team 18-0. Minnesota had softened up his athletes for the boys from West Point.

RIGHT DOPE ON MICHIGAN

When asked as to his opinion of the Michigan-Minnesota game Rockne, without the slightest hesitation, replied: "Minnesota should win by at least one, and possibly two, touchdowns. Michigan is smarter, but Minnesota has too much power. If the Gophers ever get started, Michigan is going to have more than a busy day trying to stop them. "Michigan's chance of winning must come through the forward pass. The Wolverines will find the line too strong and the sec-

ondary too good to get by with much straight football."

At the close of the Michigan-Minnesota game, I realized how well Rockne had called the turn, one week ahead, in these days of topsy-turvy football.

Michigan for a time outsmarted Minnesota, scored through the medium of a forward pass and held the edge until Minnesota's power asserted itself. The margin of victory was one touchdown.

Getting back to the starting point, if Kaate Rockne would tell what he really knows to be the case, no alibi, it was Minnesota that softened his eleven for the Army.
