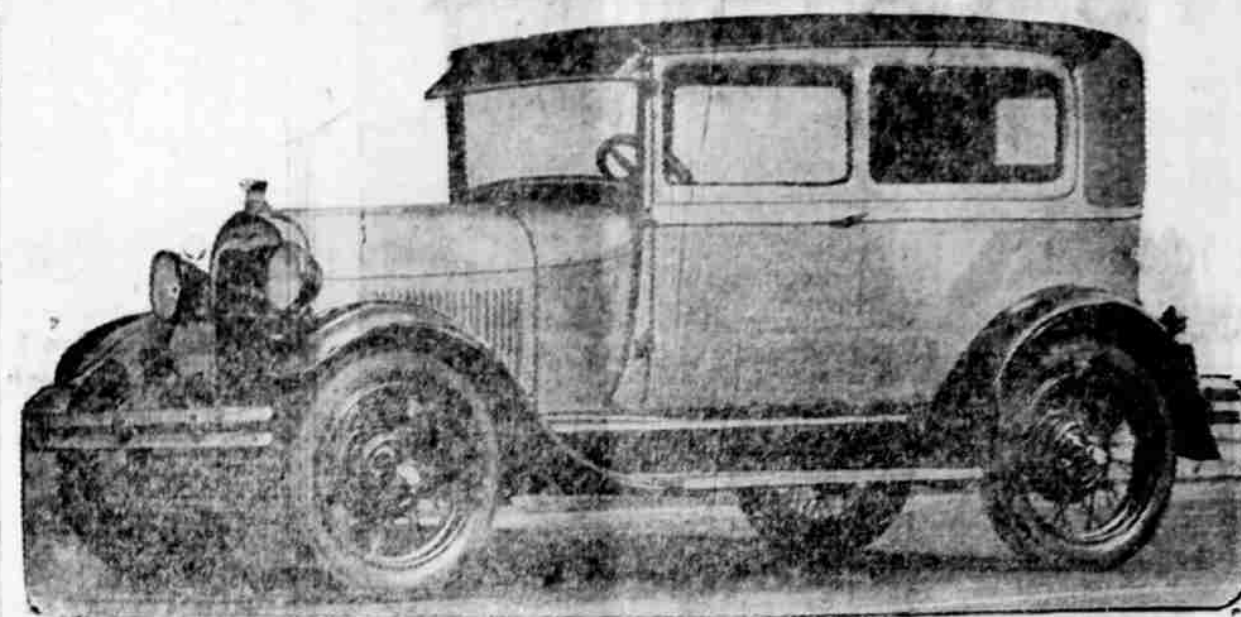

First Full Description of New Ford to be Given Tomorrow At Large Public Reception

Klamath Falls will get its first full description of the new line of Ford automobiles tomorrow. A public reception to be held by local dealers is part of the national introduction of the new Ford models. In thousands of communities all over the United States tomorrow this new line of moderate-priced light automobiles will be introduced to millions of people.

The doors of the showrooms are to be opened promptly at 8 a. m. and attendees will be on hand throughout the remainder of the day to explain the new and interesting features of the car which is expected to make a new chapter in automotive history.

The new Ford cars are said to be the product of several years of study and planning by Henry Ford and his engineers in the great Ford laboratories at Dearborn. Mr. Ford himself has announced that "there is nothing quite like the new Ford car," and has stated that it will prove just as great a pioneer in the present field of low-price light cars of quality as the famous Model T was a pioneer in its field for more than 19 years.

Among the visitors to the reception tomorrow will be many city officials, executives of business, civic and professional organizations and other leaders in the life of the community, who have been specially invited.

The performance of these new cars, it is said, will be startling when viewed in the light of automobile performance of the past. Local dealers have been notified by Ford officials at Detroit that the factories throughout the country are now preparing to produce the new car in numbers exceeding even the tremendous production records achieved in the manufacture of the Model T line.

Company officials at Detroit also reported their early announcement that production of the new Ford line will not make the Model T line obsolete. The manufacture of new parts for Model T replacements will continue to be an important factor of the Ford plants as long as any of the Model T cars are still in operation, the local dealers were advised. Because of this policy, present owners of Model T Ford cars will be able to keep their cars in perfect order as long as these cars remain in commission.

State Highway of Southern And Central Oregon in Fair Condition Despite Weather

Despite heavy rains in the lowlands and snow in the mountains, state highways in central and southern Oregon are still in good condition, according to a weekly report issued today by the state highway commission. On some state thoroughfares, the commission advises the use of chains.

Following is the report: Klamath Falls-Lakeview Highway: Klamath Falls-Ronanza: Macadam. Ronanza-Common Point: Old road, rough. Common Point-Beatty: Macadam. Beatty-Hwy: Graded roadbed, rough and muddy. Hwy-Drews Valley: Old road, rough.

Drews Valley-Lakeview: 25 miles macadam; balance fair dirt road. Fremont Highway: Bend, Lapine, Silver Lake, Summer Lake: Partly macadamized; balance unimproved dirt road. Summer Lake-Paisley: 9 miles macadam; balance fair dirt road. Paisley-Lakeview: Macadam. Lakeview-New Pine Creek: California State Line: Partly macadamized; balance fair dirt road.

Crater Lake Highway: Medford, Trail, Prospect, Union Creek: Macadam. Union Creek, South Boundary Crater Lake National Park: Closed by snow. South Boundary Crater Lake National Park: Macadam. Redwood Highway: Connection with road to Oregon Caves.

Grants Pass, Kerby, Deer Creek: 4 miles oiled macadam. 11 miles new construction in fair condition. 6.5 miles good macadam. Deer Creek-California State Line: 21 miles oiled macadam. Road open to Oregon Caves. Good macadam.

McKenzie Highway: Eugene, Belknap Springs, Sisters, Redmond, Bend: Macadam. Chains advised on summit. Make local inquiry at Eugene and Bend. Snow falling intermittently.
