day on the stand she said she drove past him between Vine and South Vineland.

Conflicting Testimony

She said she could not recall having made the earlier answer and insisted her yesterday's testimony was correct.

"Well," Prosecutor Hinkle asked, "can you tell me how many times you saw Beach on that day?"
"I only remember that one time when I drove past him," "Then you did not see him going by your home?"
"I don't recall."
"What dress did you wear when you got up that day?"
"The one now in evidence."

Doesn't Know

"Was it bloodstained then?"
"I don't know."
"Your son had a nose bleed that you think might have stained it?"
"Yes."
"But on that day were you wearing the same stockings you had on at the time of the nose bleed?"

Stopped at Insects

"No, but I had been slapping at mosquitoes while I wore those stockings."

During her earlier examination Mrs. Lillendahl stuck to her story that the murder of her husband was done by two negro robbers.

Another witness was the widow's brother-in-law, Henry Lillendahl, New York lawyer. He said that the relations between his brother and Mrs. Lillendahl were very affectionate.

Defense Rests

After calling one other witness, the defense rested. Prosecutor Hinkle then told the court that Harry Sanderson, a state witness wished to correct a mistake he had made in his original testimony. Sanderson had been expected when called by the state last week to say he had seen Beach run from the scene of the crime, when he testified, however, he said he could not identify Beach as the man he had seen.

Breaks Down

Sanderson had a nervous breakdown after a testimony and later made an affidavit to the court, the contents of which have not been made public by the court.

Sanderson said today that it was Beach he saw in the woods and that when he took the stand the first time he had fully intended to say so.

Why he changed his mind at that time, he did not say.

REMUS TO NOT BE ON STAND

CINCINNATI, Dec. 6. (AP)—George Remus, the former "king of bootleggers" served a notice upon Judge Chester R. Shook at the renewal of his murder trial today that he would not testify in his own behalf.

Remus was addressing the court in connection with a motion he had made to investigate what he termed libelous statements in a news story sent to a New York newspaper last week. Remus asked that the correspondent who filed the story be cited for contempt of court.

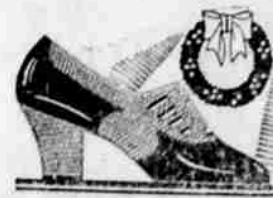

MORE GIRLS STUDYING

ART OF HOUSEKEEPING

LINCOLN, Neb., Dec. 6. (AP)—Home economics students at the college of agriculture of the University of Nebraska increased 10 per cent in number this year, bringing the total enrollment to 275 girls.

A new phase of work is being

tried out in the food study classes in which each girl is required to prepare and execute a food demonstration before an audience of classmates. Officials observe the increase as indicative of a rising demand for home economics trained women in the commercial world.

What the railroads have lost in passenger service due to the increasing use of the automobile has more than been offset in increased freight business, much of which has to do directly with the automobile industry.
