NOTED PICTURE KLAMATH LUCKY IS SHOWN HERE DOCTOR HOLDS

"The Last of 5,000" On Display in Window of Connelly Bros. Shop

"The Last of 5,000," one of the most talked of Western pictures, the one that made Charles Russell of Montana one of the world's most noted artists, is on display in the window of Connelly Brothers today.

Men of the west, especially the cowboys like to tell the story of this picture which hangs in some of the outstanding art galleries of the world today.

"It was the winter of '57, one of the hardest winters the west has ever known when Russell drew this picture," one old timer remarked this morning as he stood and gazed at the familiar scene of a snow covered field upon which a lone bear was standing just ready to drop, starved and near frozen to death. In the distance, coming closer and closer, is the coyote eagerly awaiting the last breath of his prey.

Eastern people had invested their money in cattle which were grazing on the vast fields in Montana and as the winter dragged on, the cattle continued to die off. With the last of the herd of 5,000 about to go, Russell sketched the picture and sent it east. No letter was necessary to tell the eastern people what had happened. The picture spoke for itself.

An enlargement of this picture hangs in the lobby of the Biltmore hotel in Los Angeles along with a number of other paintings of this noted artist who passed away two years ago.

Ed Bisbee of the Bisbee Hotel, formerly of Montana, is the owner of the picture in Connelly Brothers window which is valued up in the thousand dollar mark. A huge cinnamon bear, shot by Bisbee while in Montana is also on display in the cleverly arranged window.

Machine Helps Grade of Soda In K. F. Plant

With the installation of an Irwin carbonator, the grade of soda produced by the Klamath Ice and Cold Storage company has been greatly enhanced.

"This remarkable machine, the only one in Oregon so far as I know, will enable us to put out the best soda water on the Pacific coast," A. M. Collier, president of the Ice and Storage company, commented.

The carbonator is an automatic electric carbonator with a deaerator and saturation control

device attached. Capacity is 250 gallons an hour. Installation of the new machine marks one of a series of improvements undertaken by Mr. Collier since he took over the ice plant and soda works several years ago.
