



UNIVERSITY IS NEW MANAGERS STRONG BEHIND TO TAKE HELM COACH OF TEAM OF FOUR NINES

Order of "O" Pledge Support to Captain McEwan for 1928

EUGENE, Dec. 8. (AP)—Football players on the Oregon campus are behind Captain John J. McEwan, head coach, stronger now than ever before, according to a statement issued by the Order of the "O," letterman organization.

Frank Rizer, veteran grid and end-president of the order, issued the following statement today:

"The Order of the 'O' is behind Coach McEwan as a body. There is no reason for the Oregon team not to continue improving under McEwan's tutelage to the point where it can hold its own in conference competition. The organization respectfully calls the attention of interested alumni to the fact that Andy Smith, who gained undying fame with his wonder teams at California, was practically unknown in his first two years there.

Strong in 1928

"When McEwan came here he said he would have a strong team in 1928. He knew when he first looked over the athletic situation at Oregon what would be necessary to build up a winning team. He has laid the foundation for the success that he promised for next year. It is logical to bring in a new man who must tear down the foundation and lay his own before even reaching the point at which the Oregon team now stands. The order of the 'O' feels that the bringing of a new coach at this time would set Oregon athletic progress back at least two years. The team itself is back of McEwan to a man and is looking forward to next year with eagerness and confidence both in his coach and in itself. The players feel that they are just realizing the feel of McEwan's system, and it would be a keen disappointment to them were they forced to begin another period of apprenticeship to another system."

A. R. Fletcher Appointed Manager of Cleveland American Team

NEW YORK, Dec. 8. (AP)—Selection of Arthur R. Fletcher as manager of the Cleveland Americans makes new plots for four major league clubs next season.

The other appointments announced previously, find Bill McKechnie directing the destinies of the Cardinals; Jack Slattery at the helm of the Braves and Bart Shotton guiding the Phillies.

Fletcher's appointment by General Manager Billy Evans of the Indians at Dallas yesterday, met with the approval of Miller Huggins of the Yankees who is attending the baseball confab there. Fletcher was coach of the Yanks during the campaign but his assuming the management of the Indians was agreeable to Huggins.

Expressing the sentiment of the Yankees on Fletcher's new position, Secretary Edward Barrow said: "We certainly will release Fletcher to become manager of the Indians. Furthermore, we will wish him all the luck in the world on his new job."

"As manager of the Indians, he will have a much wider range for his talents and we are glad that the chance has been afforded him to better himself."

From 1909 to 1920, Fletcher gained fame with the Giants as one of the best shortstops in the league. Then he went to the Phillies where he played short until the opening of the 1922 campaign, when he was made manager of the Phils.

He was pilot of Philadelphia up to the close of the 1926 season after which he was signed as New York coach.

Portland C. of C. Pleads for New Railroad

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 8.—Form of the Portland Chamber of Commerce's intervention in the Oregon public service commission's petition to the interstate commerce commission to order the construction of a trans-state railroad was decided upon by the board of directors. The intervention argues that:

"Construction of the line of railroad east and west across the state as proposed in the complaint would provide a much better and more direct route to markets in eastern defined territories from much of the producing area of the state of Oregon than is provided by any existing route, and would contribute greatly to the development and exploitation of Oregon's latent resources."

Route Not Suggested

The chamber, it is made clear, neither favors nor opposes the particular route suggested in the complaint, which was from Crane to a connection with the new Cascade line of the Southern Pacific at Odell. The chamber proposes, rather, that the line be built "by such route as will provide the greatest development and afford the most economical methods of facilities of transportation to the territory to be served."

What route would meet these conditions is a matter for the interstate commerce commission to decide, the directors indicated.

Burns, Bend and Marshfield interests have presented to the Portland chamber arguments for various routes.

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THE REMUS TRIAL, AS SEEN BY AN ARTIST FOR NEA AND EVENING HERALD



This panorama of the courtroom during the Remus trial at Cincinnati, sketched by Manuel Rosenberg, staff artist for the Cincinnati Post and NEA Service, gives a graphic view of the sensational trial of the multi-millionaire murderer. At the left are the alienists, who must rule on Remus' sanity; behind them is the jury, with the one "flapper juror," Ruth Cross, in the rear row, and the

13th juror in front. Remus' defense is that he was insane at the time of the murder.

In the center are the principal actors in the trial. Standing in Remus himself addressing the court. Seated in the foreground are Prosecutor Charles P. Taft, son of the chief justice, and his assistant, with Defense Attorney Elston just beyond him. Reporters and spectators can be seen massed together in the background, with a

bailliff standing near the jury box. Judge Chester R. Shook, presiding at the Remus trial, can be seen at the right. In front of him is the witness chair, where the men and women who will testify for or against the defendant will sit while they tell to the jury, seated opposite, the stories that will mean life or death to the former multi-millionaire liquor seller. In the background is the crowd of interested spectators that jam the court daily.
