(Continued from page 1) Millage rate last year was \$7,061, 636.13; this year it has increased to \$8,324,619. The city millage rate last year not including the county and state tax whose total was mentioned in a preceding paragraph was 5.13; this year it was reduced to 39.8, or a total of 12 mills. Cause of the high rate last year was due to a \$52,000 special levy to provide for municipal development. Another notable decrease was that of school district number 1 which last year levied 15.3 mills and this year lowered this to 13.2 mills.
