TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 20. (AP)—French Belanger of Toronto had the flyweight championship of the national boxing association tucked away today after a fierce 12-round battle with Ernie Jarvis of London, England. The opening round Belanger floored Jarvis with a right to the heart and a left to the jaw. The bell rang and the count reached two. The Englishman nearly met his Waterloo in the third session. Belanger caught him with a wild left hook to the head, putting him down for a nine count. Jarvis weathered the lightning hail of blows and carried the fight to his opponent in the eleventh. He landed a hard right to the head that sent Belanger to the res. Belanger arose at once but was reeling groggily when the bell changed.

NCLE SAMS HOPE TO RECAPTURE THE DAVIS CUP

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—From the quiet pursuits of a business man, retired voluntarily from the strife of the tennis courts, little Bill Johnston, for years one of the world's outstanding players, probably will be drafted to join Bill Tilden in another effort to bring the Davis cup back to the United States.

Almost seven years ago, Tilden and Johnston, then in their prime, went clear down under to Australia and brought back the cup that is symbolic of the world's team tennis championship.

From then on until this year Tilden and Johnston fought successfully against the world's greatest players and they succeeded in keeping the cup in this country.

But, last September, France, with Rene Lacoste, Henri Cochet, Jean Borotra and Jacques Brugnon, battered down the two Bills and took the cup to France for its first period of residence with a Latin nation.

Following his defeat in the cup matches, Johnston announced that he was forced to retire from tournament and cup competition. He had neglected his business for seven years and he felt the time had come when he had to make tennis secondary in his program. Johnston is in the insurance and brokerage business in San Francisco.

In recent months, however, Johnston has rearranged his business affairs so that his constant personal attention is not essential and he has told friends that he may try the big game again.

The United States Lawn Tennis Association, beyond selecting the American zone for the challenging team, has not made public any definite plans as to the players that will be considered for places on the team.

Bill Tilden, still the world's second ranking player although he has lost his American championship, is a cinch for the team. He already has announced that he will go to Europe early in 1928 with Frank Hunter and will make another desperate effort to come back.

Johnston's name hasn't been mentioned outside of the chambers of the tennis association, but it is known that the little Californian is wanted badly.

To those who might doubt the wisdom of delegating to Johnston the burden of supporting Tilden, the officials of the association are prepared to ask:

"Where is there a better player in the United States to take his place?"

Turkeys can be found in south Georgia, in a limited way, near the coast of North Carolina and South Carolina. Some are bagged in West Virginia, Virginia, Tennessee and Kentucky. Also in the yam and rice belt of the central south.

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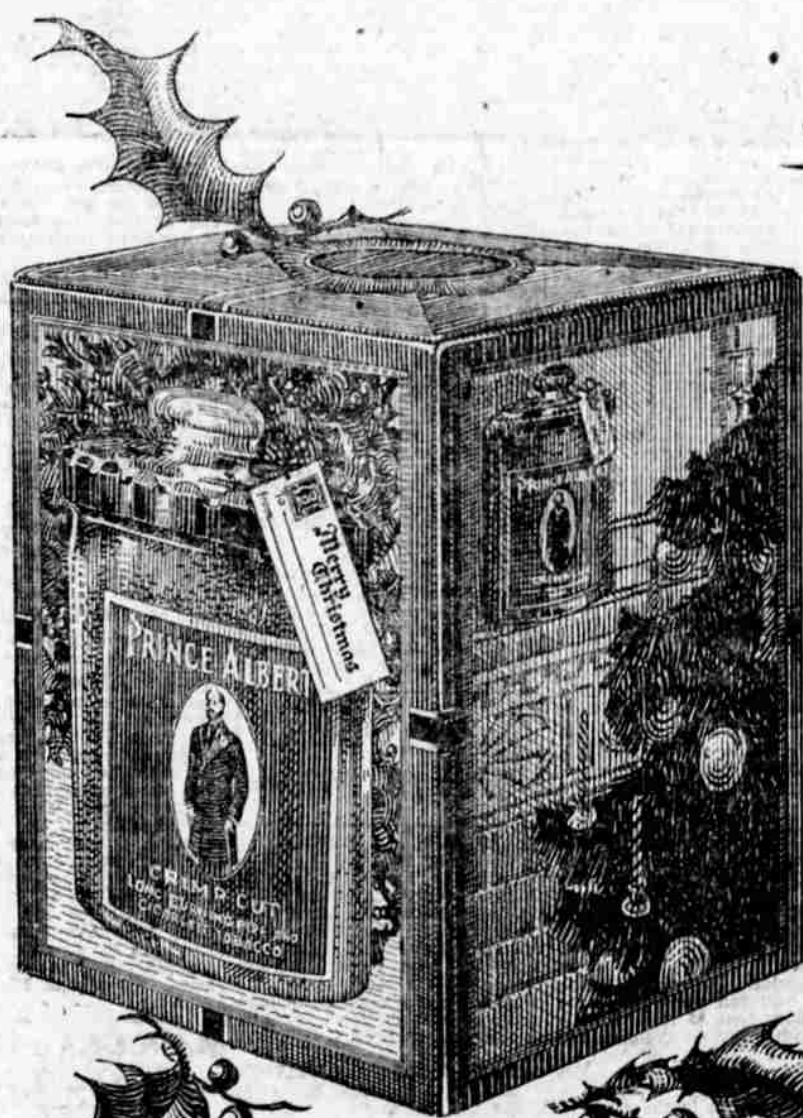
