CHANGE STATUS OF POSTMASTER

U. S. Congress Places Post Office Officials in Classified Service

A bill, placing service postmasters in the classified service has been enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, according to word received here today by Postmaster McCall. This was unheard of until the administration of former President Wilson, who made it possible for a postal employe to be raised to the rank of postmaster, according to Mr. McCall. The bill reads "That any person who has been or shall be promoted, or transferred from the classified service to the position of postmaster shall hold such position without term and shall be subject to the Civil Service Act of January 16, 1883 and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder." Mr. McCall is what is recognized as a service postmaster, having been advanced to this position from the ranks of a postal clerk.

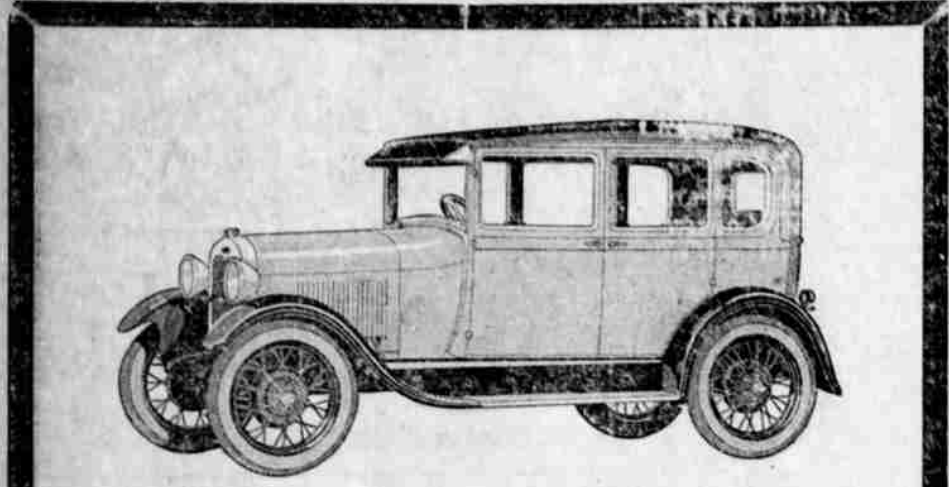
(Continued from page 1) despair over inability to make repairs. Then the boat developed a leak. We manned the hand pumps for four days and nights before we reached Mazatlan. "After temporary repairs, we set out again but the engines became hopelessly crippled and we drifted for weeks. Food and water ran out. All we had was a slice of bread each meal, shark meat, a little pork and rain water was caught in sails about once a month when it rained. Once we caught a turtle and had soup. "Finally we rigged up make shift sails and made 300 miles toward land before we were picked up by the British ship Pteron and towed into Manzanillo. The men had burned Parente in effigy. They blamed him for skimping rations which caused all the trouble."

(Continued from page 1) 10 o'clock the mine sweeper Falcon, flagship of the salvage fleet, was making fast staying lines over the position of the wreck. No sounds from the torpedo room of the S-4 in which six men are imprisoned, had been heard since six o'clock last night when seven faint taps were detected by the oscillator of the submarine S-8, sister ship of the S-4. Although the S-8 signalled at hourly intervals throughout the night no answer came back from below.

Snow has reached a depth of 26 inches on the summit of the Siskiyou and extends from the Doljarbide place to the state line. The road is extremely icy and care is urged. Two feet of snow has fallen on the Klamath Falls highway and the ground is covered from Soda Springs to the city of Klamath Falls. On the Crater lake highway cars may go as far as Prospect at which point the road is closed. There is a foot of snow at Prospect and snowplows have been at work to open it to that point. Scenery along the highway is reported wonderful. There is no snow on the Redwood highway.

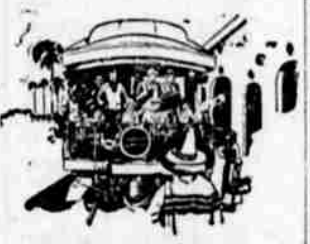
POLICE SURE OF ACCESSORY

Although this first was interpreted to mean that the child might have been killed the day previous to the collection of the ransom, the finding of the other witnesses caused police to attach less importance to the janitor's story. While the maze of clues connecting Hickman with the crime seemed to be strengthened almost hourly, by new uncovering of evidence against him, the whereabouts of the young fugitive apparently were as much of a mystery as ever. One suspect, captured about 2 a. m. today between Beverly Hills and Santa Monica, was detained until the county identification bureau opened when his finger prints were compared with those of Hickman. He was allowed to go when it was shown that he was not the man. Although they had failed in the premier object—that of running down Hickman—police today at least had determined by photograph identification and finger prints that the object of their search has used the innocent looking Bellevue Arms apartment house for his headquarters. LOS ANGELES, Calif., Dec. 21. (AP)—Deputy sheriffs early today held for investigation a youth who gave his name as Sidney Parks and who had been taken into custody between Santa Monica and Beverly Hills, suburbs, on suspicion that he was William Edward Hickman, accused slayer of Marian Parker. Although the officers said that the man arrested answered the general description of Hickman and his likeness to the hunted man was striking, a hurried check of the youth seemed to disprove that he was the man wanted.
