Tribute to the memory of the late Andy Smith, coach of California's famous "wonder" teams of a few years ago, will be paid on December 21 when the California and Pennsylvania football teams meet at Berkeley, Calif.

This game, regularly scheduled, will be part of the ceremony in the dedication of a memorial bench to the memory of the famous coach.

It was at Pennsylvania that Smith gained his first fame. There he played fullback in 1923 and 1924, winning all-American honors in his final year. From 1925 to 1927, he coached Penn.

football teams. And then went to California.

At California Smith turned out football teams that, because of their great power and successive victories, were termed "wonder" teams.

This game between Pennsylvania and California will do nothing to establish intercollegiate honors. Both teams have been beaten, and beaten many times, by rivals in its own section this year.

Penn won six and lost three games in the east. Its important victories were against Brown, Harvard, Columbia and Cornell. Its defeats were taken from Penn State, Chicago and Navy.

California, on the other hand, has won six and lost three of its

important games, the ones against California, Stanford and Washington, but did defeat St. Mary's and Santa Clara, two teams that defeated Stanford.

Offhand, neither team seems to have much of an edge on the other. Both squads should be in perfect physical condition for the game, enabling Nils Price and Lou Young to start their strongest players.

Pennsylvania, in order to get thoroughly acclimated to California weather, planned its trip to allow its men ten days on the coast before the game.

It should be a great game, with the expectancy of enough thrills to attract 70,000 or more fans to the Berkeley stadium.

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State Aggies
Correct Name
Oregon School

O. A. C. CORVALLIS, Dec. 23.

Among the host of names that have been "officially" used to designate this college, only one is actually "legal," says E. E. Wilson, Corvallis attorney and regent of the college for many years. Regent Wilson says that the only law specifying any name is the one of 1885 which created the board of regents. This said the board "shall be denominated the board of regents of the state agricultural college of the state of Oregon."

Other old-timers here including Dr. John Fulton, '92 graduate and Frederick Berchtold, pioneer faculty member, agree that in the early days the common name was "State Agricultural college," or "S. A. C." The term Oregon Agricultural college was seldom or never heard, they say, until students dropped "S. A. C." and started using O. A. C. in the first football yell, "composed" in 1893.

Library files shows that various and sundry names were used both in old laws relating to the college and in catalogs and reports issued since 1885 when the institution was taken over by the state. In addition to those already mentioned were "Corvallis State Agricultural college," "State Agricultural College of Oregon," "Oregon State Agricultural college." The nine-word name used in 1885 law is still found on college checks. Mr. Wilson pointed out that regardless of the name used, agricultural service to the state has been steadily on the increase and is greater now than ever, even though the great majority of students are attracted to other courses assigned to the college.

NOT GUILTY OF MURDER CLAIMS W. E. HICKMAN

Kidnaper is interviewed and Photographed by Newspapermen

PENDLETON, Ore., Dec. 23. (A. P.)—Seated in his cell at the city jail here this morning, William Edward Hickman declared in the presence of a crowd of newspapermen:

"I know that I am not guilty of murder and I am perfectly calm."

He added those words as Chief of Police Gurdane abruptly ended a recital of the kidnapping of little Marian Parker, Los Angeles girl. Hickman was retelling details of the confession he gave following his arrest yesterday and was telling of taking Marian to a theatre at Alhambra Thursday night of last week when he was stopped.

"That's enough," said the chief. A battery of cameras was admitted to the cell room for flash-light pictures of the prisoner. The local police refused motion picture men permission to take any shots of Hickman.

During the slow proceedings of focusing the numerous cameras, Hickman sat patiently in the door of his cell. His features twitched at times, betraying a nervousness which he made an apparent effort to disguise.
