Kuykendall Interviewed—

The following item from the Oregonian will be read with interest by friends of Robert Benson Kuykendall of this city:

"When the ice boat attained a speed of 30 miles an hour, the pilot lost his nerve, so we don't know how fast an ice boat can go on Klamath lake," said R. B. Kuykendall, at the Hotel Portland. "There isn't much snow in Klamath Falls, but the ice is eight inches thick on the lake and winter sports are in their prime. Ice boats are scooting on the lake and because of the immense stretch of the lake, they can speed for miles and miles without making a turn. A friend of mine put an airplane motor in his ice boat and started up. There is very little resistance and the boats go fast. When this boat speeded up to the 30-mile point, the operator figured he was going fast enough. I would not be surprised if the boat had gone to 100 miles an hour with that airplane motor in it. The craft went like chain lightning. The boat was equipped with a small cabin to protect the passengers from the wind. Klamath lake is well suited for ice boating and the sport is becoming very popular. With ice as thick as eight inches, there is no danger of breaking through and the lake is so expansive that any kind of race course can be laid out."

great care in the fast water above the riffles.

Johnston and his companion about 9 p. m. started up the river toward Keno, leaving Davis behind. An hour or so later they returned to find the canoe capsized and resting against the shore above the riffles. There was no sign of Davis. A hunting party across the river said that the boat had been capsized and against the bank where they first came, about an hour before. No trace of a gun or any of Davis' equipment was found in the boat.

Deputy Sheriff George Reed this afternoon appealed to the county court for grappling hooks to be used in searching for the man.

However, strong indications pointed to drowning, authorities still admitted this afternoon that there was a bare chance of Davis having paddled his way to shore and rushed home before telling his companions.

Rakowsky, World Champion Kickee, Booted in Many Lands



LONDON, Dec. 28.—If all the world were divided into kickers, the Bulgarian kickers, Christian Rakowsky, from 1846 to 1867 former Bolo ambassador to England and France and recently expelled from the inner soviet circles, would hold the world's championship as the prize kickee.

He is like that famous bound in the Missouri song about "somebody's always kickin' my dawg around." He could not be more successful if he wore on the seat of his pants a big white sign with sign with the lettering:

"Kick me here!"

Always Ready for More.

He has spent his entire life of 55 years being kicked around. He thrives on it. Every time he has been kicked in the past he has hopped up serenely some place else and often in a better position.

If his expulsion from the inner circles of the soviet were to be followed by expulsion from Poland, it is doubtful whether he would have any place to go. So many countries have kicked him out that the champion kickee would have a hard time of it finding a haven of refuge.

He's the stormiest petrel in Europe. And one of the best educated. He was born at Kotel in Bulgaria of a family which belonged to the petty Bulgarian nobility. His family owned most of their estates in the Rumanian Dobruja.

He was a revolutionary from the start. It was in his blood. One of his maternal uncles, George Mamatchef, in 1834 led kicked him out of the Bolo in-

ner circle. It's his ninth appearance as kickee.

The Box Score.

First—Kicked out of the Bulgarian college of Varna for being the leader of a student riot.

Second—Kicked out of the Bulgarian college of Gabrovo.

Third—Expelled from Germany by the police in 1893.

Fourth—Expelled from St. Petersburg (as it then was) by the police in 1900.

Fifth—Expelled from Rumania in 1905.

Sixth—Expelled from Sofia in Bulgaria in 1912.

Seventh—Expelled from Germany in 1918 where he was working as unofficial diplomat of the Bolo.

Eighth—Withdrawn as Bolo ambassador to France because of his communist activities and interference in French internal affairs several months ago.

Ninth—Expelled by Stalin and his crowd several weeks ago from any position in the inner council of the Russian communist party which rules Russia.
