Pittsburgh Panthers Are Favored in East-West Clash in L. A.

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 30. (AP)—This city's historic Rose bowl, scene of the annual tournament of roses football classics between representative eastern and western eleven was thrown open today to this year's western defenders, the Cardinals of Stanford.

With the task of beating the powerful and generally favored University of Pittsburgh Panthers before him, "Pop" Warner, veteran Stanford coach, feels that his men need all the practice they can assimilate and planned to take his men out to the Rose bowl field shortly after their arrival here this morning.

Although he has shown no worry over the betting odds, the canny western coach intends to have his veteran team well versed in the intricate reverses and double reverses he likes so well.

Thirty eight players made the trip down from Palo Alto.

While the Pacific coast team was brushing up for the final game of the season, Pitt's Golden Panthers were "pounding the rails" across the continent in the last stages of its long train ride. They will arrive here Saturday morning.

Erratic Pitching.

During the season of 1909, the Washington club of the American League had on its pitching staff a southpaw, by the name of "Dolly" Gray, so named because of a popular song of those days bearing the title—"Goodbye Dolly Gray."

The Washington club of 1909 was far from a pennant contender. It had a staff of hurlers that was none too strong. A double-header was scheduled on the day in question, otherwise Gray might not have been permitted to remain on the roster and figure in a freak bit of pitching that otherwise couldn't have happened. He would have carried out the thought of the popular song and said "Goodbye."

If "Dolly" Gray is living, and I certainly hope he is, I am sure he will recall the game in question, for I regard it as without an equal from the angle of good and bad pitching.

Gray was a southpaw along the lines of Herb Pennock of the Yankees. He didn't have a world of stuff but he had plenty of poise and, as a rule, great control. In this particular game he was drawing the corners too fine.

Walked Eight Batters.

Can you imagine a pitcher working a game in which he allowed only one scratch hit, yet was soundly beaten because of one bad inning, which featured a sudden lapse of control?

The game was staged in Chicago. It was the first half of a double-header. I have always believed Gray should have been credited with a no-hit performance, which would have made the incident all the freer.

If my memory serves me correctly, Pat Dougherty hit the ball that was scored a hit. It took a bound as it neared the shortstop, causing him to momentarily juggle the ball, leaving the runner at first by an eyelash.

In that same inning, Gray, who prior to the one bad inning pitched in fine style and who kept it up after the explosion, gave eight bases on balls, seven of them in succession.

Ordinarily such a thing couldn't happen since the manager would deride his pitcher before he got into so much trouble. But, as I have explained, Washington had a weak hurling staff.

And He Lost Game.

All the runs that were scored off Gray's delivery came in the inning in which he suddenly became wilder than even a peaceful resident of Borneo.

Usually, Gray could work the corners to the best possible advantage. In this one particular inning he was just missing his mark. I felt that I am conservative in saying I called at least 20 pitched balls that didn't miss the plate more than an inch or so. In a great many cases the count was three balls and two strikes on the batter.

The only hit made in that inning in the entire game, unless my memory is at fault, was the fluke single made by Pat Dougherty on a badly bounding ball to the shortstop. It would have been an easy out had it not been for the fluke hop.

The following inning Gray was back on his game and held the White Sox at his mercy as he did during the rest of the game. The one wild inning, however, was fatal.

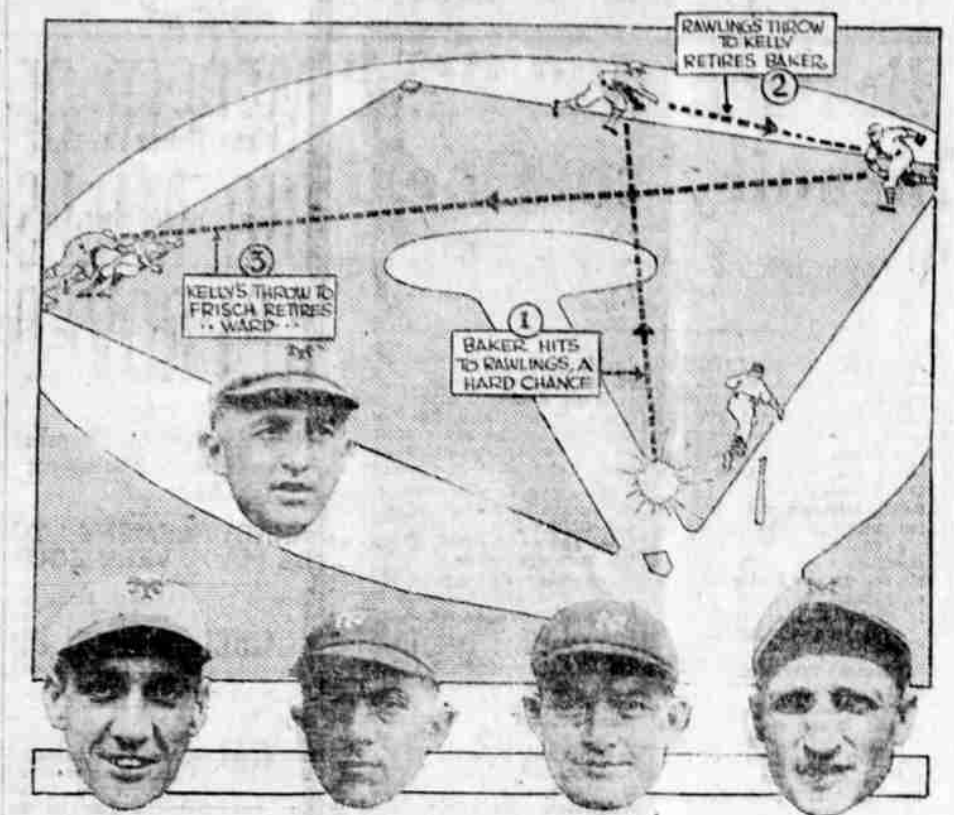

Thrilling Fielding Play of Giants in 1921 World Series Stands Out

Here's the greatest fielding play Billy Evans witnessed in his 22 years' experience as an umpire. It happened in the 1921 world series. "Home-run" Baker started the play by hitting between first and second. John Rawlings, playing for him, made a great stop and threw him out at first. Aaron Ward, on second, thought Baker had hit safely, and started for third. George Kelly's throw to Frankie Frisch was so hard that Frisch was nearly knocked down, and Frisch was forced to jump at Ward to tag him out as he hooked perfectly into third base. The lightning-like double play, Rawlings to Kelly to Frisch, won the series for the Giants.

In over \$500 major league ball games in which I have officiated, I have seen so many sensational plays afield that it is a difficult matter for me to make up my mind what play I regard as the superlative feat in fielding.

After considerable thought I am inclined to think that the play that brought the 1921 world series to a close was the most thrilling of them all. Perhaps the big stakes for which the two teams were playing made the play stand out all the more.

Back in 1911, Frank Baker, then with the Philadelphia Athletics, won for himself the title of "Home Run King" largely by his slugging in that particular classic. Unless I am mistaken he led the American League in home runs that year with nine. Nowadays, Babe Ruth makes that many in a couple of weeks.

It will be remembered that Baker made home runs in the 1911 series off both Marquard and Mathewson at critical spots, turning what seemed defeats into victories for the Athletics.

It is, therefore, all the more interesting that Baker, noted for his feats of slugging, should be one of the victims in the most thrilling fielding feat I have ever seen.

The 1921 world series was the first meeting between the two New York clubs in baseball's classic. That year the teams were playing best five in nine games.

The Yanks had gotten away to a two-game lead, but when the eighth game of the series rolled around the Giants were in front four games to three. Unless the Yanks could win the eighth game the affair was ended for another year.

An error enabled the Giants to score a run in the first inning. That one run, as it later turned out, decided the ball game and the series. There was no more scoring. However, in the ninth, the Yanks staged a rally that promised great things, but proved a "dud." It did not get the stage, however, for the greatest fielding play I have ever seen.

The Yanks made their bid to even the count or win the game by sending Ruth to the bat as pinch hitter. He had been out of the game because of an injured arm.

The Yankee fans went wild when Ruth took his place at the bat. They had visions of a home run that might even the count. The Babe failed 'em, merely grounding out to first.

Ward, the next batsman, was passed. His reaching first base set the stage for the thriller that was to follow. Frank Baker, "Home Run King" of other days,

was sent in to pinch hit. A circuit drive by him would win the game for the Yanks.

Rawlings, a substitute, was playing second base for the Giants. He had played sensational ball throughout the series. When Baker stepped to the plate, Rawlings moved several steps to Frisch at third. By diving at Ward, who went into third with the most approved hook slide, Frisch won the decision, ending the game and winning the series for the Giants.
