ASK TEACHERS
TO KNOW MORE
ABOUT CAPITAL

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2. (

A law which would make the study of a course in Oregon school legislation compulsory for all teachers is one of the great needs of the state, declared Earl R. Douglass, professor of education of the University of Oregon, in speaking before the classroom session of the Oregon State Teachers' association convention here Thursday.

Taking as his topic, "University training for professionalism," Dr. Douglass pointed out the need for a thorough training in the subjects which are taught, and explained the system of "norms" at the University of Oregon, whereby this training is assured.

University training first of all gives thorough instruction in the most modern methods of teaching, it was pointed out, and then it is made certain that the prospective teachers know thoroughly every subject which they intend to teach. This insures the state of competent educators who can be entrusted with the youth in the schools.

Both Washington and California have laws governing the study of courses in legislation and school system, Dr. Douglass said, and Oregon should adopt similar statutes. This would mean that persons coming from outside of the state with "certificates" would have to acquaint themselves with local conditions and practices, and a better grade of teaching would result. Teachers sent out from Oregon schools would also benefit from such a study, it was said.

The classroom session was one of the best attended meetings of the conference, and many present took in the discussions that followed Dr. Douglass' talk.

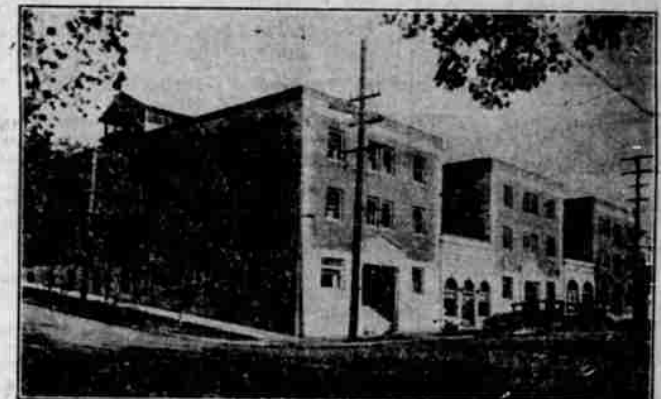
