



## Slugging Wood Boxer Versus Chopper Will Hard Puncher Meet Godfrey In Title Bout

NEW YORK, Jan. 6. (AP)—Paulino Uzcudun, the "Battling Basque" is going to do his own heavyweights eliminating.

Following Jack Delaney's example Paulino has broken from the ranks of the floozies of heavyweights Tex Rickard has been jockeying around in his effort to find a "legitimate contender" for Gene Tunney's crown.

Announcing Paulino's decision, Al Mayer, who heads the Basque's board of strategy, said Paulino would meet George Godfrey, the latest so-called "black menace," in a bout at Los Angeles next month. While contracts have not been signed, the terms have been agreed upon, Mayer said and there remains now only to fix a definite date. The promoters have settled upon February 14, Mayer said, but he prefers February 21.

"Godfrey seems to be generally recognized as a heavyweight menace," said Mayer. "Other title contenders appear to be avoiding him and the intention seems to be that the present heavy-weight champion would not meet him under any circumstances."

"Paulino is willing to meet Godfrey or anybody else."

BOSTON, Jan. 5. (AP)—Jack Sharkey, heavyweight contender who is to meet Tom Heeney in New York next week, thinks it would be a good idea if promoters of championship bouts, were to set aside five percent of title gates for a fund for aged fighters.

"I have been thinking of the poor fighters who pass away in poverty," said Sharkey while he gave a sparring partner a rest. "If I am named Tunney's opponent I will try and get Rickard and Tunney to agree that a certain percentage be set aside for such a fund."

A five per cent fund of a \$2,000,000 gate would insure \$200,000. Adding to it all the time would soon bring enough to have a home and a hospital erected."

NEW YORK, Jan. 5. (AP)—Less than a month since he clinched his right to the crown, Tommy Loughran of Philadelphia will be called upon tomorrow night to defend his light heavyweight title against the damaging fists of Leo Lomski, of Aberdeen, Wash., in a 15-round bout at Madison Square Garden.

"The title shot" climaxes a sensational climb to first rank rating by Lomski whose vicious body punching has won most of his fights for him.

Loughran pits his boxing skill against the coast contender's slugging ability and most of the experts have established him the favorite. So have the bettors at 2 to 5 here and at 2 to 1 in Philadelphia, the champion's home town.

Loughran won undisputed recognition as champion when he defeated Jimmy Slattery, of Buffalo, in a close match here last month. Slattery up to that time, had been recognized as the titleholder by the national boxing association.

## Will Meet Loughran Leo Lomski is Accepted as Early Opponent By New Light Heavyweight Champion



NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—For the second time within a month the world's lightweight championship will be at stake when Tommy Loughran, the defending champion, meets Leo Lomski, one of the most promising challengers, in Tex Rickard's Garden on January 6.

Loughran recently won a clear claim to the disputed title when he defeated Jimmy Slattery, who had been recognized as the champion by the National Boxing association.

When Loughran was recognized by the New York commission as the champion, after he had beaten Mike McGuire, he said he would do anything asked of him to prove his right to the title.

He was asked to meet Lomski and accepted the match. In the meantime, however, Tex Rickard had a chance to make a match with Slattery and Loughran made good his promise by agreeing to fight Slattery first and then defend the title against Lomski.

It is the first time since Eugene Criqui defended the featherweight championship against Johnny Dundee shortly after he had won from Johnny Kilbane that a champion has accepted a formidable challenger in such a short space of time.

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the veteran Jack Sheridan, umpiring on the bases, was far better than mine, I walked down to him for assistance.

"Looks as if rain or darkness might make trouble for me, Jack, so I want your help," I told him. "Don't let me try to go too far. Your judgment is far better than mine and when you think I should call the game, give me the sign."

He gave it to me at the close of the ninth inning, but hoping one or the other might break the tie in an extra session, I held up one finger, a signal that I would like to play another inning. He nodded his head in assent.

Neither team was able to score in the tenth and I was for trying another inning, although it was quite dark, but Sheridan absolutely refused permission and started to walk off the field.

This, of course, was a definite cue for me and, turning to the stands, I announced the game had been called on account of darkness.

**Was Panned Severely.**

Then occurred one of those strange weather phenomena as we walked to our dressing room. Hardly had I called the game, when the sun somehow peeked out between the clouds, and for a minute or two it was lighter than at any time during the game.

However, inside of five minutes the rain was coming down in bucketfuls and in 10 minutes the ground was ankle deep in mud.

My desire to try to play the eleventh inning was very bad judgment. Sheridan had the situation sized up perfectly, except for the few minutes of sunshine that followed my calling of the game.

Yet, the next day I was featured in all the papers and took a sound drubbing in every one of them. On the whole the newspaper boys have been more than kind to me and really this trade was easily the worst to which I was ever subjected.

The sum and substance of every criticism was that Sheridan should have been the umpire-in-chief in so important a game. If so, the game would have gone at least another inning with Sheridan in charge. Yet it was my judgment that we try another inning, to which Sheridan properly refused.

I am sure Jack felt worse about the criticism handed me than I did and I didn't relish it by any means. He wanted to explain the situation to the baseball writers and set me right, but I refused on the grounds that it would seem as if he was making an alibi for me. It was the most unpleasant day in my career, as well as the day after.
