There Is No Fancy Cure For Adenoids When Badly Diseased

In the back wall of the nasal passages is lymphatic tissue usually called adenoids.

When the adenoids become infected and swollen they block breathing by the nose, the mouth is kept open and person afflicted not infrequently has as a result a stupid expression.

As a result of continuous mouth breathing, the face is likely to develop an unusual appearance, the upper lip shortened and turned out, the lips thickened, and a line formed between the cheeks and the lips.

May Cause Ear Infection.

Because of an infection in the adenoids, germs pass up the tubes that connect the throat to the ear and there is likely to be an infection of the internal and middle ear cavities.

Since the nose is blocked, the speech of a child with adenoids is nasal in tone; the child is

restless at night and not infrequently snores, gasps and tosses about because of the difficulty in breathing. Difficulty in breathing, furthermore, may interfere with the development of the chest cavity which becomes narrow and flat.

There is no fancy cure for the prevention or treatment of infected and swollen adenoids. A competent physician can remove these by a minor operation and the improvement that follows re-

Covering a daily route of 39 miles over muddy roads, many of which are impassable with miles of detour necessary, J. F. Dixon, carrier on route RFD No. 1, is anxiously awaiting the approach of spring.

On his daily route Mr. Dixon takes care of 1599 people with 245 boxes having a daily distribution.
