point out that it is the same type of case as the De Autremont mail robbery and murder in tunnel 15 in 1923. In the face of widespread publicity the De Autremont trio failed to show up. Suspicion grew to conviction when their absence lengthened into years.

More than 100 shots of government ammunition were found at the cabin by Ambrose and Rogers. They spent the entire day at the cabin which showed signs of recent habitation.

Wild western story magazines were strewn helter skelter around the cabin; this fiction appeared to be his only reading matter.

The two officers traced his tracks around the cabin. They found a box of 23-49 caliber shells, partly used. Inside the cabin. These were purchased at the Gun Store by Meek.

Meek appeared to be a fanatic on revolver marksmanship. Bul let holes were found in his one-room shack, and the wood shed was literally riddled.

Ambrose hopes that the analysis of the criminologist will establish once and for all whether or not Meek was the murderer of Ansel.

Other clues were picked up by the chief of police which may prove beneficial to the state in event Meek is caught and prosecution is decided on.

If in flight, the chief of police believes Meek will seek small towns and avoid the cities. He believes he will most likely be found working on a remote ranch.

MEDFORD, Jan. 7. (P)—John Meek, sought by Klamath county authorities for questioning in connection with the murder of John Ansel of Klamath Falls, was reported to be in the Table Rock district this afternoon. Sheriff Ralph Jennings left at once to investigate. A resident of the district telephoned the report to the authorities, when he sighted a man he thinks resembles Meek, acting suspiciously.
