RIVERSIDE IS BANNER SCHOOL FOR DECEMBER

Central School Places 2nd, Fremont 3rd, and Fairview Fourth

Riverside school with an average attendance of 97.8 for the month just brought to a close is the banner Klamath Falls school, according to reports just compiled at the office of City Superintendent J. Percy Wells.

Central school placed second in the monthly report with an average attendance of 97.4; Fremont placed third with an average of 97.2; Fairview fourth with an average of 97; Mills fifth with an average of 96.2.

The fourth grade at Riverside was banner room for the month while the second low grade was the only room having no tardy marks for the month.

At Pelican City the fifth low grade was the banner room while the second low, third low and sixth low had no tardy pupils for the month.

At Central school the second low grade had no tardiness for the month. The first high grade at Fairview was the banner room while the fourth low had no tardy marks recorded.

Fourth low grade at Fremont held honors for the banner room while the sixth low grades had no tardiness.

Honors as banner room for the school went to the second low grade at Mills school. The sixth and seventh high grades had tardy records.

The city total registration for the month was 1631 while the average attendance was recorded at 96.9 for the month.

WARMER DAYS BRING RENEWAL OF ROAD WORK
