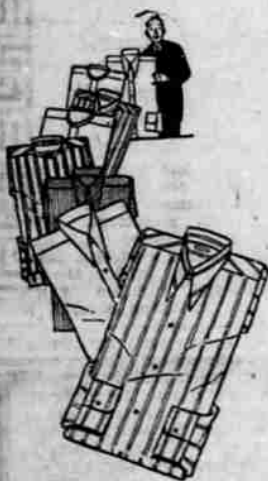

JACK SHARKEY IN GOOD TRIM FOR BIG FIGHT

Favor Bostonian 2 1/2 to 1 Over Heeney; Top Ticket Price \$22

NEW YORK, N. Y., Jan. 13 (AP)—

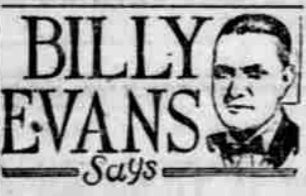
Tex Rickard hopes to match the winner against Tunney but he had announced that his decision will depend on the showing of the battlers.

Heeney's record includes two encounters with Paulino Uzcudun, one of which was in the Spaniard's favor while the other was a draw. Both decisions were unpopular. Heeney has a victory over Johnny Risko to his credit, however, and Risko conquered Paulino.

About Sportsmanship
In some quarters there exists the belief that sportsmanship is a trait that has no place in professional athletics.

I cannot refute such an opinion too strongly. During the 22 years I have spent in the American league, I have seen any number of bits of true sportsmanship that compare favorably with the very best college brand.

It seems to me very fitting that my final sport superlative should be dedicated to not a play, game nor individual but to this trait of sportsmanship.

Of course it is necessary that some particular person typify sportsmanship and I take great pleasure in handling the honor in this instance to Manager Bill Carrigan of the Boston Red Sox.

Play That Troubled
It all happened some years ago when Bill was winning pennants and world's championships for Boston instead of occupying a cellar berth.

Some 10 years back the double umpire system was in vogue in the American league. It happened that my partner was ill and I was working alone. I was suffering at the time from an injured knee, otherwise this episode of which I am about to write would have never happened.

My injured knee made it difficult for me to cover much ground. With the bases empty I worked back of the catcher but with men on the bases I stationed myself behind the pitcher.

During the days in which I umpired alone, there was one play that always troubled me. In fact, worried all umpires in the days when a lone official was in charge. I have reference to hard hit balls down the first or third base line. From a position back of the pitcher it is physically impossible to get over on the play and judge with any degree of accuracy, balls hit over the bag.

Agreed to Assist
With a bum knee, I realized the risk was all the more difficult. I happened to comment on the fact to Bill Carrigan, who was catching the game.

"If you care to have me, any time you are in doubt, I will call them for you," said Bill.

Knowing Bill Carrigan as I did, I knew he would call them as he saw them. Call 'em right. I told him if I was in doubt I wouldn't make a ruling until I glanced in his direction and got the sign. If the ball was fair, he was to raise his right hand.

Galloway Proves Uncertainty Of Baseball

Chance May Come With Detroit to Repeat His Brilliant Season of 1922

The major league sensation of today is very often the minor league performer of tomorrow.

That isn't literally true, but in a sense it best explains the uncertainty a baseball manager and club owner is up against in making his selection of players.

Recently the wires carried the story that Chick Galloway, on whom all major league clubs previously had waived and who was sent to Milwaukee in a trade, had come back to the majors via the Detroit Tigers.

The case of Chick Galloway, I regard as a concrete example of the great uncertainty that goes with the game of baseball, particularly from a major league standpoint where the highest point of efficiency is demanded.

Just 10 years ago, Chick Galloway made his baseball debut in professional circles as a member of the Atlanta team of the Southern Association. His previous baseball connection had been confined to the collegiate brand as player and coach at Presby-

terian college of South Carolina.

Galloway joined Atlanta in the fall end of the 1918 season and played in only 39 games. He did not hit in the field but was weak at the bat, hitting only 182.

The following season he started, jumped his batting to 263, a matter of 80 points, and looked so good that he was bought by the Philadelphia Athletics.

Reporting to the Athletics in the fall of 1919, Galloway was immediately given a chance to prove his worth with Connie Mack's pliant team. He played in 17 games and tossed big league pitching more than tough, as he batted only 143.

Connie Mack, realizing that Galloway had come to the majors with only one year's experience in professional circles, hardly expected him to step right into the lineup. The following season he took part in 98 games, showing improvement in all features of play.

However, it was not until 1921 that he was definitely established as the regular shortstop on the Athletics. That season he batted .265, a big increase over the

Without a doubt, the season of 1922 stands out as the big year of Galloway's career. The experts rated him the most improved ball player in the American league for that season. A majority of them a selecting their all-star teams from the junior circuit honored Galloway by naming him for the position of shortstop. He turned in the fat figure of .324 at bat in 155 games that year.

Unquestionably 1922 was the high spot in Chick's career. I went out on the limb myself with the prediction that Connie Mack's shortstop troubles were ended. Since then Galloway has played brilliantly and erratically, never quite reaching the top.

For five years, Mack jockeyed with Galloway, hoping that he ultimately would make good on his great year of 1922 and continue such play, but at the close of the 1927 season Connie weakened on him. Asking and getting waivers from all major league clubs, he was passed on to the minors, only to be resurrected by George Moriarty of the Tigers.

If Jackie Traener's throwing isn't handicapped by his injured finger, Galloway is almost certain to warm the bench, but if Tavener is unable to play Chick will get his second chance to prove his worth with a real good club, after having been passed along to the minors.
