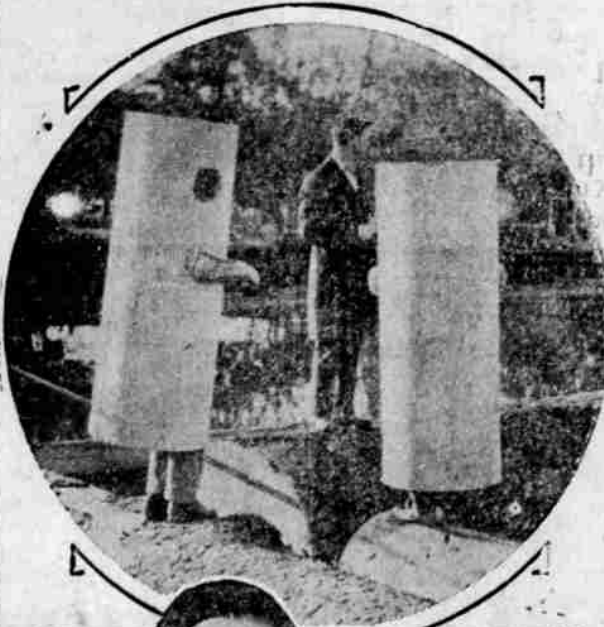
WAITE HEARING IS HELD TODAY

Freeman Waite charged with the robbery of a grocery store on East Main will be brought before Justice of the Peace, William Barnes, this afternoon to answer to a charge of burglary. The complaint was filed by Keith Ambrose, chief of police. Waite was picked up by city officers on December 23, at the rear of the Buick garage and at the time of his arrest is charged with having in his possession groceries from the store, which he is alleged to have robbed. In order that the man might be held until formal charges could be placed against him, he was placed in the city jail on a charge of vagrancy. His past record shows him to have served three terms in the state penitentiary at Deer Lodge, Montana, on charges of grand larceny.

MEEK'S RECORD IS UNCOVERED

ROSEBURG, Jan. 13. (A7)—J. L. Meek, wanted in Klamath Falls in connection with the murder of John Ansel was convicted to the local justice court on a game law violation last September according to Justice of the Peace Hopkins. The case was not connected with the Klamath Falls murder suspect until Ed Walker, deputy game warden, today received a circular bearing a picture of the wanted man and immediately recognized him as the one arrested last fall for killing a fawn by use of an automobile spotlight below Canyonville. He paid a fine of \$200. At that time a Mauser pistol and a rifle were confiscated from him and turned over to the state game department.
