



PELICANS LOSE GREAT GAME TO JACK SHARKEY AND T. HEENEY NORMAL SCHOOL GO SLOW DRAW

Clean and Hard Fought Contest Keeps Fans on Edge Throughout

The Pelican Bay basketball team went down to defeat before the fast stepping Ashland Normal school outfit last night in the Pelican City club house in one of the cleanest and best played games ever seen in Klamath county. The final score showed Pelican Bay 26 and Ashland 48.

Starting out with a rush the Pelican Bay boys forced to a slight lead but it wasn't long before the Ashland team had the lay of the land and their superior team work and condition put them ahead, never to be stopped. The Pelican Bay quintet contested every inch of the way however and the game was far more interesting than the score might indicate.

Pelican Bay seemed to lack their dash and speed of last year and were not in the physical condition to stand forty minutes of the kind of basketball the Ashland boys had to offer. The loss of Benson, the speedy Pelican guard, may have been a factor. The Pelican boys would have had to been at their best however to beat the future schoolmasters as they have some mighty fine players and were well coached. Dixon, the elongated center, was a whole team in himself the first half, ringing up 17 points before the whistle ended his activities. He was easily the star of the game, getting in every play and his height made him doubly effective in getting the ball in every tangle. The Pelican boys however held him to a lone basket for the second half for the time he was in. Other Ashland players who showed up especially well were May, Wirth and Spears.

For Pelican Bay, Red Wenner and Big Pete Peterson bore the brunt of the attack. Trailing by many points and seeming unable to get going the Pelican team fought every minute up to the final gun. The Pelican team has been out of training for three weeks and they plainly showed the effects as the game went on. The game was one of the cleanest ever played in the county, both teams showing the finest kind of sportsmanship.

On the Ashland squad were two Klamath boys who entered the Normal school since the holidays. They were Louie Stewart and Max Newsum, both former members of the Legion team. Both Stewart and Newsum played last night during the last half and showed up very well considering the short time they have had to learn the system.

Jack Sharkey and Tom Heenev struggled through 12 rounds to a draw in Madison Square Garden last night to the disappointment of spectators.

The judge's verdict left the patrons and ring critics divided in opinion, the former believing the New Zealander should have been awarded a decision. On the other hand the majority of ring experts picked Sharkey. And then there were many in sympathy with the draw.

Instead of the former lunging, crashing Sharkey, the one that fought Dempsey, the fans witnessed a cautious sailor man who had to exert himself to the limit to overcome a big lead piled up by Heenev.

Sharkey was far from the form he displayed against the manassa mauler last July. After the second round, Heenev put up a savage attack, banging away with solid rights and lefts to the head and body which forced Sharkey to cover. The sailor tried hard rights on Heenev's chin but they didn't seem to take effect and by the fourth round Sharkey was becoming a steady target for the opposing heavy artillery.

Sharkey ran amuck of a hard smash to the head in the fourth round in trying to protect his body, and in a spirited exchange, one of Heenev's blows ripped a cut under the Bostonian's left eye.

Heenev followed up his advance in the fifth round and pummeled Sharkey with rights and lefts to the body in a close exchange.

Sharkey tried to clinch but the New Zealander planted a terrific right to the jaw which sent Sharkey reeling to the ropes.

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COYOTE POISON NEARLY KILLS SHEEP HERDER

Lake County Irishman Has Terrible Experience on Range

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Jan. 14.—Coyote poison which brought an agonizing death to one of his dogs, almost snuffed out the life of Dennis Daugherty, in the desert country the first of the week. Daugherty is a sheep tender employed by John L. O'Connor.

One of the sheep dogs had accidentally picked up a piece of poisoned bait generously sprinkled with strychnine. A few minutes later it was in convulsions.

Daugherty ran to his faithful dog and ministered to it as best he could. Believing tobacco to be an antidote, he crammed a generous helping of tobacco down the dog's throat.

In spite of the efforts of Daugherty, however, the dog died a few minutes later. After working over the dog Daugherty washed his hands, thinking this would wipe away all trace of the poison.

Has Convulsions.
Some time later he put his fingers in his mouth to whistle to the other dogs, and a moment later, he too, was in convulsions.

Apparently some of the strychnine crystals had remained beneath his fingernails and the poison taken into the system when he whistled for his dogs.

After being semi-conscious for some time, Daugherty revived and started back for camp.
