G. N. CONTRACTS BEFORE I. C. C.

traverse areas of heavy stands of pine timber.

As to possible new construction of branch lines in the Klamath territory, the Great Northern has provisions in the contract with the Southern Pacific which pave the way. It is provided, for example, that the Oregon, California & Eastern (Strahorn) line "may be extended as the parties may direct."

The contract further says: "If one of the parties desires an extension and the other does not, the party desiring the extension may cause it to be built and connected with the Oregon, California & Eastern and the Oregon, California & Eastern must make reasonable through rates. The party not agreeing to the extension may purchase a one-half interest therein for one-half the cost, plus interest, at any time within five years after construction."

The contract for purchase of control of the Shevlin-Hixon company railroad, extending 23.41 miles southward from a point near Bend, provides that the Great Northern shall pay \$235,000 for a three-fourths interest. Shevlin-Hixon company would reserve the right to run logging trains over this line and also the newly constructed Great Northern link reaching to Chemult, which is the point of connection with the Southern Pacific. At the end of five years the Great Northern proposes to purchase the other one-fourth interest under conditions which it might at might turn the road back to the original owners, however.

Alternate Scheme Offered.
Provisions of the contract to permit the Shevlin-Hixon company to make free use of its line, in which it would retain a one-fourth interest for five years, is the one it is believed the commission may especially scrutinize. As an alternative the Great Northern offers to buy all of the logging road and make a reasonable log rate.

With the Spokane, Portland & Seattle and Northern Pacific, which jointly own this subsidiary with the Great Northern, a 99-year contract is arranged covering operation of Great Northern trains between Fort Wright at Spokane, and Wishram, Wash., where the Oregon Trunk, subsidiary of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle, branches off to Bend.

An important provision of this contract from the Portland standpoint is that the Great Northern may run also between Wishram and Vancouver, Wash.

Second Contract Made

A second contract for 99 years has been made with the Oregon Trunk and Northern Pacific for operations between Wishram and Bend, a distance of about 77 miles. A contract has been executed for operations on part of this same mileage with the Deschutes Railroad company and the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, or which the Deschutes company is a subsidiary. This is because of the fact that part of the line commonly used between Wishram and Bend belongs to the Union Pacific subsidiary. Another contract with the Union Pacific subsidiary and the Oregon Trunk covers use of a small link of track connecting with the Shevlin-Hixon mill plant at Bend, now jointly owned and used by the Oregon Trunk and Deschutes railroad.

So also has the contract covering purchase of one-half interest in the Strahorn line. This purchase has been accomplished but still is subject to final approval by the commission. One provision of this contract is that, property of the Strahorn line in Klamath Falls north of Sixth street, no longer needed by the owner, shall be sold.

Hauling Period Set.
A final contract with the Southern Pacific provides that the southern line shall haul all logs between Chemult and Klamath Falls for a term of five years, receiving all revenues and bearing all the expense. Provision is made, however, under which the Southern Pacific's monopoly on all local south-bound log business may be terminated before the expiration of five years.

BROCCOLI CROP WILL BE LARGE

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 14. (AP)—Facing with prospects of an exceptionally early season and a bumper crop Umpqua valley broccoli growers are endeavoring to devise ways to market what they expect to be one of the biggest crops ever harvested in this district. Unusually warm January weather has caused the broccoli to mature very rapidly and it begins to appear that some of the early strains are apt to be ready for shipment in carload lots by the first of February, with the peak of the harvest about the first of March and at least two weeks earlier than usual.

Umpqua Valley Farmers Plan to Reap Profits From Big Harvest

Since the first of the year Roseburg has been enjoying clear warm weather which has brought about exceptionally rapid development of broccoli. Growers prefer to have the crop held back, as the later the harvest the better the opportunity for a good price. The California cauliflower movement is now nearing its peak and continues into April, if the Oregon crop is late it comes in after the bulk of the California shipments when the market is growing stronger, but when placed in direct competition with the California crop it does not bring as high a price.

It is estimated that there will be nearly 600 carloads shipped from the valley during the season. The local cannery is making arrangements to pack and pickle a large amount of broccoli this year and Manager Norton is now on an eastern trip to arrange a market for the output. One of the local shipping concerns will use a new type of crate, which is expected to be more attractive to the trade and will lessen shipping costs.

At the present time there are a few crate lot shipments being made daily, running from 20 to 50 crates per day. These, however, will probably stop if the weather turns colder.
