A newspaper reporter, granted the doubtful privilege of witnessing the execution of Ruth Snyder and Henry Judd Gray, violated an agreement with Warden Lawes and snapped a picture of the unfortunate woman as she sat on the death chair. This picture was displayed on front pages throughout the east.

We know nothing of the circumstances surrounding the incident but, speaking from the newspaper side of the fence, we condemn this act. If ever there was an occupation which is based on trust and honor, it is the newspaper business—particularly the news and editorial end. Every editor, every cub reporter, has authentic information which would arouse interest of readers if printed.

Why isn't it printed? Because the information was given in confidence and the newspaperman if he is worthy of his name, would not violate that confidence. Even though it cost him his job. Where would a newspaper be if it was not trusted by those who control the reins of government in every community, state and national capital? Needless to say, it would be in a very bad fix. The reason why stories breaking today are covered so completely on the day they break, is that the writer has usually been fully acquainted with the situation before it came to a climax; he has been told by the powers that be what there is to know and he has been asked to keep the information to himself until it is ready to print.

Warden Lawes of Sing Sing is indignant, but we hope that when his anger cools he will not condemn the entire newspaper fraternity because of the foolish and inconsiderate act of one.

Hail to K. C. H. S.

We would call the attention of Klamath citizens to the Klamath County High School athletic spirit—a spirit which is beginning to reap its harvest after years of discouraging setbacks.

Last night the K. C. H. S. basketball team was nosed out by the Medford high school at Medford by a margin of two points. The two teams were tied at the closing whistle and over eagerness in the play-off period resulted in two fouls on Klamath and the resulting free throws. Yes, it was defeat, but compared with past defeats, it could almost be regarded as a victory.

At last Klamath is occupying a prominent position in southern Oregon athletics. Its days of being the underdog are apparently over. It has defeated Grants Pass and barely missed a win over its traditional rival, Medford.

The long and short of the matter is that this group of youths who spend their days in the big brick building on the hill, would not, and could not be discouraged. During the dark days of overwhelming defeats by anybody and everybody the students of the school kept their heads up and their fists clenched. One week they would be beaten on the football field by eight or ten touchdowns. The next Friday, the day before they would play another team equally as strong, the entire student body would stage a rally, just as if they were sure of victory. They gained the reputation of being the best losing school in southern Oregon.

Such a spirit cannot be quenched, can not be hurled or side-stepped. The time had to come when the Klamath high school boys hit their stride and, it appears, the time is near at hand.

She was only a mathematician's daughter—but, oh, what a number!

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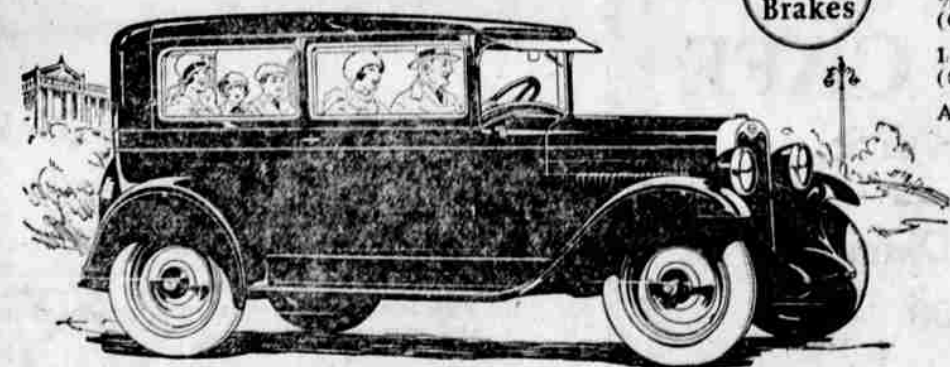
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
