ASPIRANTS FOR TUNNEY CROWN FIGHT TONIGHT

Two Contenders Will Feature in Separate Eastern Bouts

NEW YORK, Jan. 16. (AP)—Two contenders for Gene Tunney's heavyweight championship go into action tonight in the Metropolitan district.

Heading a boxing card at the St. Nicholas arena, Jack Delaney, of Bridgeport, Conn., one of Tex Rickard's eligibles, will battle in a ten-rounder against Sully Montgomery, giant Texan.

At the new Broadway arena in Brooklyn, Paulino Uzcudun of Spain, also a title aspirant will tackle Ed Zesley of Boston.

Just where Delaney and Paulino will fight in Rickard's heavyweight elimination plans will depend largely on their showing tonight.

Meanwhile Rickard is making plans to leave for Miami on Wednesday, where he will confer with Tunney. Rickard said he had no plans in regard to selecting a challenger for Tunney for a bout in June but hoped that the present contenders might bring forth a suitable opponent.

"All I know is that Tunney and Jack Dempsey will fight this year," Rickard declared. "The Sharkey-Heeney outcome has upset all my plans and the outlook among the present heavyweight possibilities is not very encouraging."

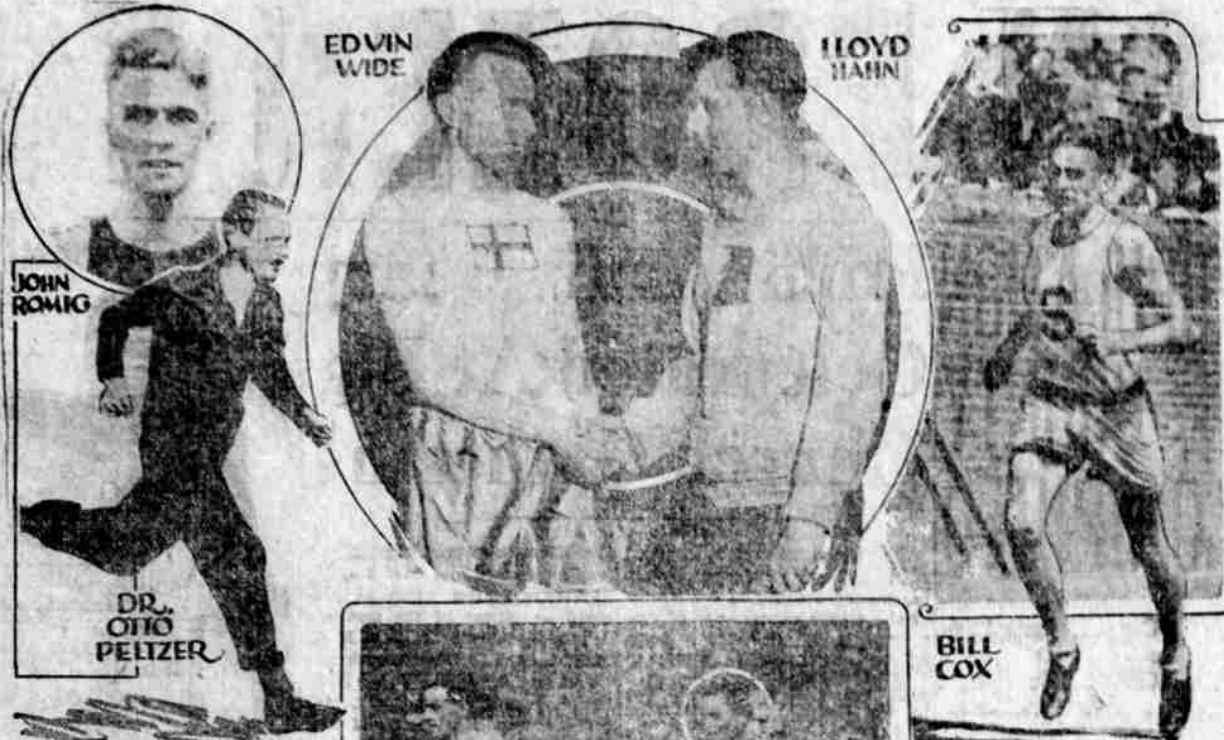
country to the western boundary of the Fremont national forest.

Need Middle Distance Runners for Olympics

Feeling fairly well set for the sprint races with such stars as Paddock, Borah, Locke, Bowman, Haney and McAllister, the American Olympic Committee is setting its glasses on the indoor tracks, scouting for good middle-distance talent.

Since time to humiliating to recall, the United States has failed to win a race of more than 200 meters in the Olympic games and in 1924 the sacred ground was trespassed when Harold Abrahams of England won the 100-meter race from a flock of the best sprinters that ever represented America.

For years Lawson Robertson, head coach of the American team, has been praying for youngsters to go in for the quarter-mile, the half and the mile, but only a few have had the tenacity to stick to it and the field from which to pick the 1928 runners necessarily will be smaller.

Three of the best of the American flock—Lloyd Hahn, Bill Cox and Blundy Romig—are now in training for the indoor season and will continue through for the outdoor trials.

Hahn recently resumed training after a long rest and Romig a few days ago put on his togs

and won a cross-country race near Philadelphia. Cox, a student at Penn State college, has been in almost continuous training.

Hahn, because of the many races he won last year indoors and the records he set, is considered to be the best chance for American points in Amsterdam.

His victory over Edwin Wide, the Swedish star, should be discounted, however, because none of the foreign runners know much about the wooden track.

Bill Cox, however, may be the leader of the American squad. He is one of the greatest cross-country athletes developed in years, having won the national

Intercollegiate championship two years in succession and he is now training strictly for the flat races.

Romig, also a Penn State product, was an ace runner and a veteran of the 1924 team and if he goes to Amsterdam it can be taken to mean that he will train in Holland and will be out there trying.

There, of course, will be more runners appointed to the team and one of them may be Johnny Zola, captain of Wisconsin's cross-country team and the winner of the last Western Conference race.

Zola at least is serious in his ambition to make the team as he left the class room after the mid-winter examinations and went to work so that he would have enough money to finance himself in the event that he made the squad.

The American middle distance runners will have some of the best runners in the world to beat at Amsterdam, including Germany's great star, Dr. Otto Pelizer; Paavo Nurmi, Finland's champion and Edwin Wide, the great Swede.

Hahn has beaten Wide, Nurmi and Pelizer in the 400-meter race.

There probably will be some more retirements, vacancies and assorted disputes this year which will give the rival governing bodies more healthy disputes and will give Rickard the financial pleasure of straightening out things again for them to unstraighten again.
