DOCTOR P. NOEL GETS SUPPORT

The Klamath Lake society has endorsed Dr. Paul M. Noel for membership on the Oregon State Board of Dental Examiners and in a resolution has requested Governor I. L. Patterson to appoint him April 1 next at which time there are two vacancies on the state board. Klamath and Lake counties have never had representation on the Dental board before.

Dr. W. A. Leonard, president of the local society, was a candidate for the position but withdrew in favor of Dr. Noel.

The Deschutes County Republican Committee at Bend, Representatives Denton G. Burdick, and Ralph S. Hamilton, as well as State Senator Jay H. Upton have previously endorsed Dr. Noel.
