The Evening Herald wishes to congratulate the property owners on Main street from Eighth to the Esplanade for the wisdom and far sightedness they are showing by starting a movement to widen Main street in that zone from ten to twelve feet.

Nothing can be more metropolitan in thought and act in these days of increasing traffic than to widen a street before it is everlastingly too late.

Klamath Falls has one drawback in that her Main street and many other streets in the congested business district are entirely too narrow. They were laid out in days gone by when no one could see the great need of wide streets. But the motor vehicle came and with it came that dire need of wider thoroughfares. Many cities are spending millions of dollars today, condemning large modern buildings and doing everything that money can do to increase the width of streets.

From Eighth to the Esplanade on Main street ten to twelve feet can be added to the width of Main street now whereas in a couple of more years such an undertaking would mean the wrecking of new business buildings and thus become tremendously expensive.

With this zone widened it is easy to understand that business houses situated there will reap a great benefit for the automobile commands the situation today and there is no use to attempt to deny it.

We repeat that the property owners affected are showing farsightedness and good business judgment by putting through at this time the widening of Main street in that district.

RODENT POISON RECEIVED HERE

County Agent C. A. Henderson Lays Plans for Control Work

While destructive ground squirrels are still deep in their winter sleep, preparations for exterminating as many of the rodents as possible when they start in their work of destruction next spring, are under way.

A shipment of 50 ounces of strychnine was received Saturday by County Agent C. A. Henderson and will eventually be mixed with oats. The poison soaked grain is to be spread around the rodent infested fields.

The usual method of control work that has prevailed in the past, will be followed this year.

County Agent C. A. Henderson said. The poison will be mixed and sold at cost by the county agent's office. It will not be over that of last year—ten cents a pound—and may be under. Originally the poison was sold at 15 cents a pound.

High Blood Pressure Cause Constant Puzzle to Science

It is generally known that many diseases appear constantly in certain families. Physicians believe that the disease itself is not hereditary but that the person inherits a certain type of body structure which makes him especially susceptible to the condition concerned.

High blood pressure has been investigated in many laboratories, but thus far no definite cause has been found for it. All sorts of theories have been held and have been investigated, but the results have in general been negative.

There are persons who assert that the disease is due to eating too much meat, to the taking of alcohol, to the use of tobacco, or salt, and indeed that worry plays a considerable part in its onset. Some say that excesses of all kinds are primarily responsible.

On the other hand, there does not appear to be any scientific evidence to indicate the exact proportion to which any single excess may be responsible.

There are already accumulating records of entire families who suffered with hypertension and who die of brain hemorrhage, chronic inflammation of the kidneys, or other conditions associated with high blood pressure. An investigation made by Mortensen led him to the conviction that high blood pressure is definitely hereditary, and that there are associated with the peculiar type of body structure certain changes in the manner with which the body digests protein substances.

These facts should not cause anyone to despair of the usefulness of good hygiene. Perhaps it will not add greatly to the length of life of a person who is a member of a notoriously short lived family. It will, however, make him feel a good deal better during most of the short period that he may have to live.

KLAMATH WILL COOPERATE ON LAKEVIEW ROAD

Foresee Early Completion of State Highway Connecting Two Counties

LAKEVIEW, Jan. 16.—A promise of cooperation in completing the Lakeview-Klamath highway was given a delegation of Lake county officials and business men at a conference with members of the Klamath county court and State Highway Commissioner "Pop" Gates at Klamath Falls. The local delegation was advised that Klamath county is ready to spend \$5,000 on this highway this year, with the state providing the remainder of the funds with which to complete this important state roadway.

Mr. Gates told the local delegation that the contract for grading the Bly-Beatty section probably will be awarded at the February meeting of the commission, and steps toward completing the new road between Lakeview and Bly-Beatty probably will be taken early this spring.

With this assurance of cooperation, the local delegation are now hopeful that the Lakeview-Klamath highway will be put in shape for all-weather travel by next fall inasmuch as the Devil's Garden grading has already been ordered, and the remaining work has been promised.

Those who attended the conference from here were County Judge Kelly, County Commissioner Fisher, Zim Baldwin, Lee Beall, and A. J. Ousley. The local committee returned home last night.

At The Pine Tree

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TWO PORTABLE MILLS PLANNED

Erection of two portable sawmills on the Green Spring mountain is included in the \$20,000 improvement and expansion program of the Moon Lumber company of Ashland, according to A. C. Moon. The pine market at the present time being at a low ebb, Mr. Moon stated the local company has disposed of its pine timber and has purchased 320 acres of fine fir timber on the Green Springs, approximately 10,000,000 feet of timber, and this will be placed on the market from the local mills. Immediate building of the new band mill in this city is being held up while negotiations are under way for the purchase of an additional 12 acres of land directly across the

road from the present planing mill.—Ashland Tidings.

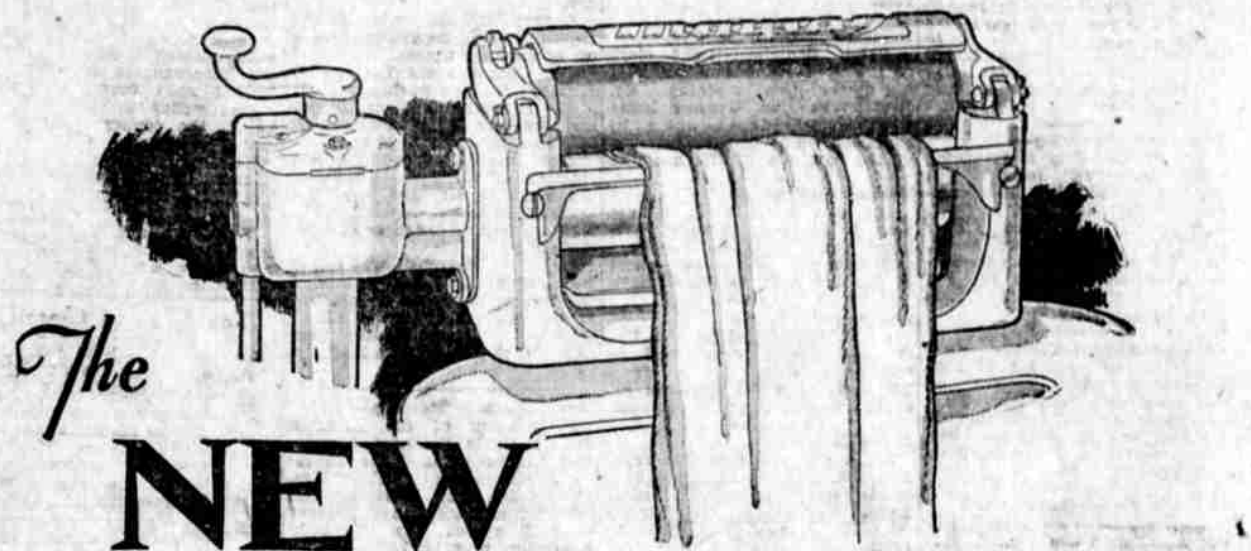
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
