



Jack Delaney Knocks Out Montgomery With First Punch of Bout

Sully Misses Left Hook by Two Feet and Then Bridgeport Fighter Crashes Terrific Right to Chin; Fighter Out for Five Minutes; Paulino Kayoes Ed Keeley

NEW YORK, Jan. 17. (AP)—Knockout victories had boosted the stock of Jack Delaney and Paulino Uscudun in the heavy-weight market today.

Delaney furnished an unusual feat in ring performance last night by landing a single hay-maker on Sully Montgomery's chin in 20 seconds of the first round of a ten round bout.

Uscudun eliminated Ed Keeley from the picture in little more than two minutes of mauling in the second round of another ten rounder. The referee stopped the bout.

Starting a campaign for recognition as a challenge for heavy-weight honors, Delaney struck but one blow, a right to the chin, to bowl the giant Texan on the canvas.

Montgomery, with the ponderous poundage of 216 against the Bridgeporter's 180 3-4, rushed on his rival after they shook hands and missed a vicious left swing by about two feet. Delaney stepped forward nimbly and caught Sully with a solid smash, ending the fight.

It was five minutes before Montgomery was revived with the aid of restoratives. Some 5,000 fans were jammed in the St. Nicholas ring as Delaney flashed the form of the days when he was the world's light heavyweight champion.

The mystery over Paulino's antics in twice evading a bout with Keeley remained unsolved after the basque decisively whipped the Bostonian at the new Broadway arena in Brooklyn. About 5,000 persons saw the tussle.

Keeley's southpaw tactics failed to make any impression on the Spaniard. Keeley landed some hard body punches in the first round but missed frequently. Paulino rapped his foe time and again with terrific right hand smashes to the head.

Shortly after the second stanza was under way, Paulino bore in furiously with a swift two fist attack to the body and face which sent Keeley spinning around the ropes. Paulino staggered the hub-boxer with a right to the jaw which would have dropped Kelley but for the interference of the referee.

Paulino leaves Thursday for a 15-round bout against Romero Rojas in the building at Mexico City on January 29.

Most Valuable Rookies of 1927

Billy Evans Pays Distinct Tribute to Wilcey Moore And Lloyd Waner

Whom do you regard as the two most valuable first year players in the majors for 1927? At the close of the season, a great many fans have asked me that question. Going back over the 22 years I have spent in the majors, such a query would ordinarily prove a rather tough one, yet I doubt if the question of the two outstanding first year youngsters was ever more clearly defined than last season.

I have no hesitancy in saying the most valuable youngster in the National League was Lloyd Waner of the Pittsburgh Pirates. Pitcher Wilcey Moore of the Yankees assumed a similar role in the American League.

It is a rather strange coincidence that these two players, the outstanding stars of the majors, should graduate into first company from the same minor league.

During 1926, Lloyd Waner started with the Columbia team of the South Atlantic League. Waner batted .345 for the season, right up among the leaders. To me the most remarkable fact about his play was the fact that he enjoyed a great year although a member of a hopeless tailender.

Columbia finished last with a percentage of .274, practically 400 points below the champions and 200 points below the mark of the club that finished seventh in the race.

The above figures will give you some idea of what a bad team Waner played on and what a handicap he worked under. It takes a real player, one who loves the game, to keep stepping at top speed when his team isn't going anywhere.

Waner, joining the Pirates in 1927, and getting a chance to play regularly after "Kiki" Cuyler jumped over the traces, continued to deliver the same kind of a game in the majors in his first year as he had featured his debut in the minors. He was an important cog in the winning of the pennant by Pittsburgh.

He took part in 150 games and established the wonderful batting record of .345 in 628 times at bat.

Pitcher Wilcey Moore of New York was even more prominent in the winning of the pennant by the Yanks than was Lloyd Waner in Pittsburgh's triumph.

In his first year in the majors, Moore swept aside all tradition that has clung to first year pitchers and turned in 12 victories while losing only seven ball games. It is conservative to say that he saved a dozen more. Thus Wilcey Moore, in his first year, did something that only a few pitchers accomplish over their entire career—made possible the winning of 30 ball games for his team.

While Waner was struggling hopelessly with the tail-end Columbia team during the 1926 season, his work being the only redeeming feature of that club's play, Wilcey Moore was pitching at the Greenville team to a pennant in the same league. All Moore did was to win 30 games while losing four, for a mark of .882.

Major league baseball offers nothing that parallels the careers of Lloyd Waner and Wilcey Moore in their first year in the big show. Few players are fortunate enough to meet with the success that greeted these two athletes in their first season out of the minors.

Unquestionably, Wilcey Moore and Lloyd Waner were outstanding in their first year in the big leagues. There are many experts who doubt if these two players will be able to maintain the high standard set during the past season.

Another unusual feature in connection with these two phenomena is, despite the fact that last season was the first chance either had to show his stuff in the majors, Moore is about 10 years older than Waner.

All of which places Rickard in a sort of jam. One of the best cards in the class will have to be knocked off if the Sharkey-Heeney match is decisive. The winner then would have to fight some heavyweight and the field of possibilities will consist of Risko, Delaney, Paulino or a kid from heaven.

It would be logical to toss Dempsey in with the winner but that would be an outdoor shot and there wouldn't be a place for it on the calendar if Tunney can't be made reasonable. It may
