Fees brought in from hunting and fishing licenses granted in Klamath county for the year of 1927 totalled \$13,892.50, a gain of more than \$2000 over that of the previous year. This announcement was made from the office of Lloyd De Lap, circuit court clerk. Hunting licenses led with a total of 1,675 issued. Of this total 95 were minors and 22 non-resident hunters. Licenses for fishing in the lakes and streams of the county brought a total of 1,249. Out of this total 276 were resident anglers and 766 combination anglers and hunters. The revenue totalled \$15,939.

KILLER FAILS TO TELL WHY

home Hotelling at first denied the charges. He broke down and confessed, the officers asserted, after being identified by a farmer who had helped him extricate an automobile from a mud hole near the place where Dorothy Schneider's body was found.

Had Repainted Auto

The automobile which was used for the kidnapping was found at the Hotelling place. It had been freshly repainted.

Text of the confession was not made public. High lights in the statement as given out were that Hotelling stopped the child while she was returning from kindergarten at Mount Morris, near here.

"I don't know what came over me," the confession said.

"I was driving along and saw Dorothy. I got her into the car thinking I would take her home. She cried. I drove her to the Snyder road (the muddy road in which his car became mired) and carried her part way across the field. She still cried and wanted to go home. She said 'I would tell my father, so I did out my knife and stabbed her twice.'

"I have been thinking night after night of the Hickman case, turning over in my mind the details of that crime."

The possible bearing of the Hickman case was dispelled later, police said when Hotelling confessed to similar attacks on children over a period of years. Two of these attacks, according to officials, occurred in Owsong. One was on a two-year old child, and the other on an eight-year old girl.
