Looking for Meek—

Search for John Meek, wanted as a suspect in connection with the murder of John Ansel in the Gun Store on December 21, took on a new aspect on Tuesday when new posters identifying Meek were issued by the sheriff's office. Finger prints of Meek, obtained from the government through his army service, a good photograph and specimens of the hunted man's handwriting were sent out to law officers of California and Oregon. KLAMATH VETS TO BE HELPED

Along with hundreds of other American Legion posts in the United States, the Klamath Falls post has thrown in its "oar" in the nation-wide drive to secure a time extension for filing applications for adjusted service certificates.

The last day for filing was December 31 and there were thousands of ex-soldiers who had failed to take advantage of Federal aid.

Copies of a resolution favoring an extension were mailed to the Oregon delegation in Congress brought to telegrams, one from Franklin Krell, congressman, and a second from Charles L. McNary, senior United States senator.

Following are the communications: "Will file resolution with Congressman Hawley, chairman of the sub-committee of the ways and means committee, considering adjusted service certificate legislation immediately."

Rodent Control Asked—

A recently created rabbit fur market has opened the way for a greater rodent control activity in the Klamath basin, as well as for profits to the rancher who would devote spare time to poisoning or trapping and skinning jack rabbits, according to Harlan Gubser, government hunter. Word from the rodent control office of the biological survey at Portland indicates that prices averaging 50 cents a pound are paid for rabbit skins. Information as to markets and handling of skins is available at the rodent control headquarters in Portland, according to Mr. Gubser.
