The "Dads" of Oregon

Oregon University management suggests an organization of the fathers of students who are attending that institution. It is to be a sort of a fraternal organization the purpose of which will be to review work being done by the University, the habits of the youngsters and the general layout of affairs at Eugene.

Usually such organizations amount to laudation societies and meet only to endorse and praise anything and everything that comes under observation. We say this because of the legislative committee visits to state institutions in years past. In those days legislators were supposed to investigate but in reality they were entertained royally and returned to Salem with nothing but praise for every department and willing to strain the purse strings of the state to meet demands of further appropriations.

Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, head of the University, is not of the praise-seeking temperament. If we analyze him correctly he is a man who wants results above everything else. His reason for inviting the "dads" of the state of Eugene, we believe, is to receive honest criticism and constructive suggestions. If this is true the "dads" organization can be of great benefit to the institution.

Long has it been known that boards of regents at both the O. A. C. and U. of O. have been docile endorsers of whatever either institution desired to do, and probably the new organization will help do what many believe the board of regents should have done for a number of years.

The problem of conducting the University of Oregon, backed as it is by less than a million people, and expecting it to keep its place in the sun alongside neighboring universities backed by several million people and large taxable wealth, is not a small one and we believe the "dads" of Oregon when they meet in convention at Eugene will consider that point first.

The move is worth while and the experiment of having such a gathering can do no harm, and may do some good.

The Heflin Attack

From the East—H. R. Giesman of Boon, Iowa, is among the guests stopping at the Hotel Arcade today.

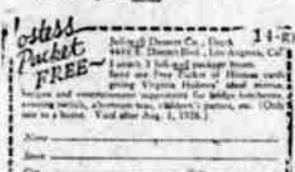
