

PLANS FOR SKI RACE ARE MADE

(Continued from page 1) mountaineers and trappers in this section of the country that no party of skiers, could possibly have encountered more unfavorable snow conditions for skiing than did those 28 entrants who competed in the 1927 event. A raging blizzard of dry snow with intense cold featured the start of this race at 8 a. m. As the day lengthened and the contestants climbed higher on the Cascade mountains, the temperature rose sufficient to thaw the snow just enough to cause skis to "stick" and make the going exceedingly difficult. Besides the hard going and trail breaking, the snow was falling in large chunks from high in the branches of mighty pines and onto the back of the hard-working, sweating skier who had probably at this stage of the game loosened or removed altogether his coat and shirt. Arriving above timber and soaring the completion of one-half the race at Crater Lake lodge, the runners encountered another element in the form of wind in great velocity, which quickly froze their outer garments. However, with 21 miles more to do there was too much danger of losing their place in the race to consider comfort, and they were immediately "off" again on the return trip which, of course, was made in remarkably short time, since a trail was now well broken and most all down hill to go.

While the contestants are striving for a place in the main event high up on the Cascade in the Crater Lake national park, the crowds at Fort Klamath will be kept in touch with the progress of the race by telephone reports coming in from the four stations within the park and a continuous show of motion pictures of scenes along the course and of the lake in winter, can be seen at the main bulletin board.

The citizens of Fort Klamath are sponsors of Klamath county's annual festival of winter sports as a growing and enduring institution, and are arranging a program of entertainment and interest to visiting crowds. Starting simultaneously with the ski runners of the main event of the day an amateur ski race will be launched at Crater Lake lodge, with Fort Klamath as the goal. It is anticipated that the participants in this amateur event will break a trail in their descent in sufficient degree to materially shorten last year's record of seven hours 24 minutes for the 42-mile course.

snow battle and many small contests, all on the show, will occupy the intervening interval between the start and finish of the main feature of the day. 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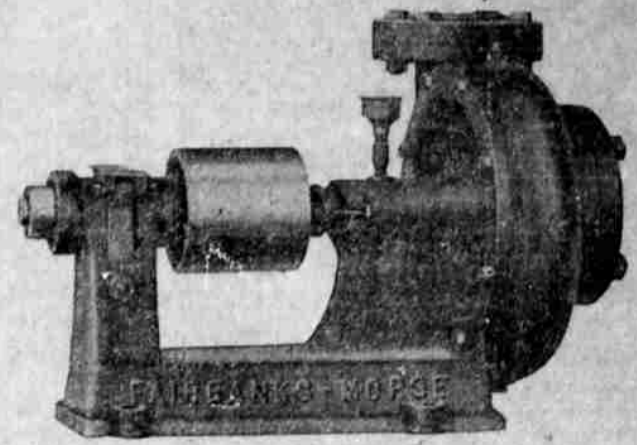
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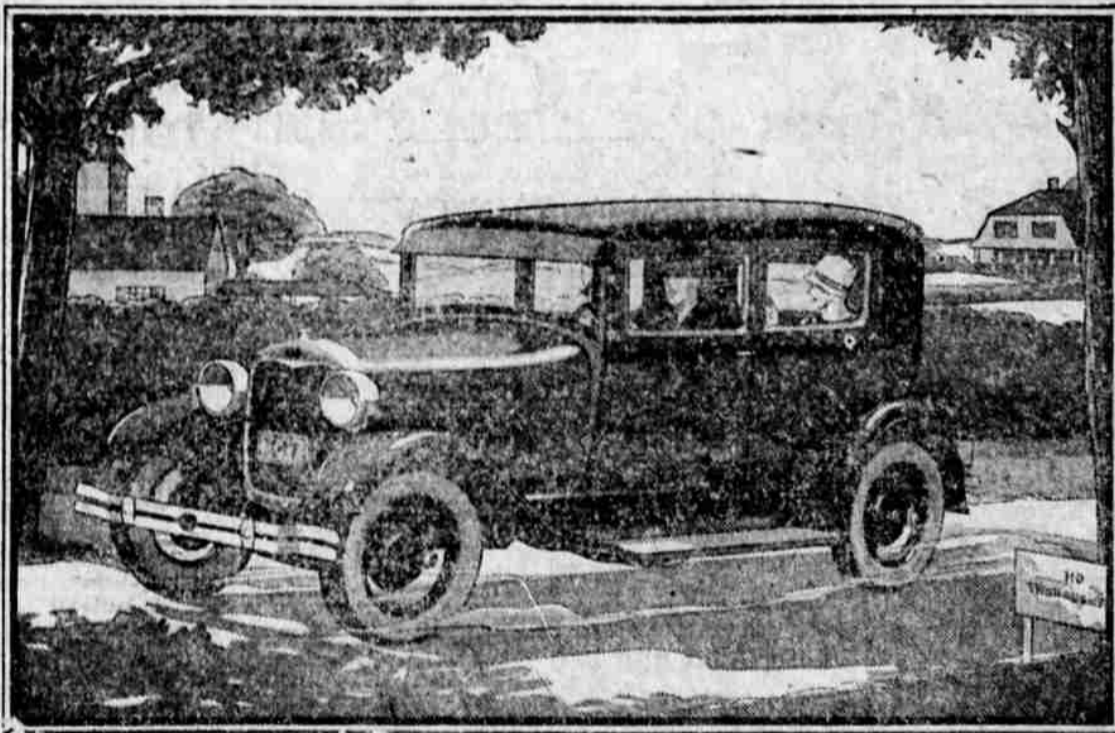
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
