LAKEVIEW HAS HIGH HOPES OF NEW RAILROAD

Contracts Submitted to I. C. C. by Northern Line Regarded Favorably

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Jan. 23.—A move in railroad circles which may be of paramount importance to Lakeview and Lake county was disclosed last week with the filing of contracts by the Great Northern Railway company that the northern line will not enter the Lakeview territory, leaving the area to be tapped exclusively by the Nevada California Oregon railway.

The Great Northern became joint owner of the Oregon California & Eastern railway through purchase at the time the agreements between S. P. and G. N. for the use of the Natron line were completed. The present agreement provides that the joint extensions of this line may not reach farther eastward than the summit between the Syran and Sprague river and the Chewaucan and Goose Lake water sheds. The contracts, it is thought, will be readily approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Local observers see in the move a centralization of Southern Pacific activity in the Lakeview district, the possible extension of the N. C. O. eastward to connect with the O. C. & E. giving the S. P. a direct haul east from Klamath Falls, and a possible northern extension of the N. C. O. to a connection with the Union Pacific at Crane or Burns, an arrangement which would be of great strategic importance in offsetting the advantage gained by the Northern lines in its successful entry into the Klamath country. There is much activity under the surface to bear out the possibility of these plans.

Members of the Oregon Public Utility commission are at present engaged in a tour of Western Oregon communities arousing interest in the cross state line from Crane to Odell. It appears that neither Klamath Falls nor Lakeview is on the itinerary of the junket. Klamath is actively opposing the pushing of the line at present in favor of the work on the Modoc Northern, through agreeing in principle to the new

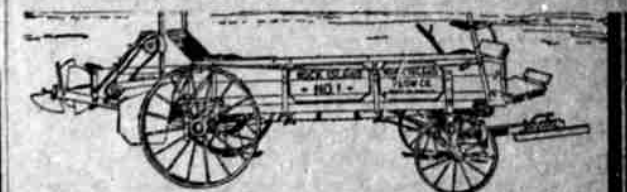
