INSECTS TAKE MILLIONS FROM U. S. FORESTS



Fire, great enemy of forests, here acts as a lifesaver. The U. S. Forest Survey uses it to burn down trees infested by injurious insects and so minimize the tremendous loss due to the pests.

 WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—Not content with destroying \$2,000,000,000 worth of food crops annually, the army of insects is now attacking the source of our lumber supply, causing a loss of \$150,000,000 yearly.

So secretly do insects strike at the heart of a stretch of woodland that their presence is only revealed by the havoc they have wrought, unless a radio microphone or other sensitive device is used to detect their silent borings within the trees.

Nine forest insects are known. They include the western pine beetle, southern pine beetle, mountain pine beetle, eastern spruce beetle, black hills pine beetle, spruce bud worm, Engelmann spruce beetle, gypsy moth and larch sawfly. The western pine beetle alone, during the past ten years, has killed on a single area over one and one-half billion board feet of the best trees with a stumpage value of more than \$3,000,000.

The bureau of entomology of the United States Department of Agriculture spent \$150,000 before arresting the progress of the pine beetle in this particular area.

Combine Against Pests
 Co-operative forest-insect control on a mammoth scale is now being undertaken on federal, state and private lands on Pacific coast and Rocky mountain areas. More than one million acres of land and in excess of eleven billion board feet of yellow-pine timber, with a stumpage value of over \$25,000,000, are involved in a single project.

Despite the vastness of this undertaking and similar projects, Uncle Sam's expenditures for fighting tree-killing insects in the entire country do not exceed \$100,000 annually. The combined requirements of federal, state and private agencies in this war upon the beetle do not exceed \$500,000 annually.

Eradication methods vary with the nature and intensity of the infestations. Commonly, however, where great tracts of trees are falling prey to these stealthy workers, fire, usually an enemy ally of insects, is caused to spend its fury on the trees badly infested. A less drastic control method and a novel means introduced by the bureau of entomology is that of exposing infested trees to scorching rays of the sun.

Foreign Epidemics Costly
 "The most serious menace of disease to forest crops at the present time lies in the imported epidemic," says the forest service. "The chestnut blight, imported from eastern Asia on nursery stock in the early nineties, has all but exterminated this useful tree throughout its northern range. Quarantines of foreign-tree nursery stock, the only effective means of preventing such diseases, have only recently been put in force."

"The western white and sugar pine forests are threatened. Under eastern conditions a financially practicable method of local control has been worked out which will save the eastern white pine in the trees of its greatest commercial value, but whether these methods can be adapted to western conditions remains to be demonstrated."

"During the past four years, in co-operation with the northeastern and lake states, a total of 1,025,384 acres have been cleared of currant and gooseberry bushes, thus protecting the white pine in this area and making it safe for the future production of this valuable crop."

Trees, at all ages, are subject to girdling, canker diseases, root rots, etc., while after maturity heart rots rapidly reduce the timber content of the living trees. Structural timber and other wood products rot through the action of fungi.
