



Chiloquin Commission Will Stage Another Slugfest in Arena Next Saturday Night

CHILQUIN, Jan. 27.—Plenty of action will be afforded fight fans on the first fight card of the year which is scheduled to take place at the Chiloquin arena next Saturday night, January 28. Seven popular Klamath county fighters have been signed to make their appearance at the reservation city. Damon Savage, matchmaker for the Chiloquin boxing commission promises the fans a card fully as good as the last spectacular carnival of fistiana when Gorman and Vaughan fought a remarkable ten round fight. The card this time is billed as a 32-round affair with three Klamath county men appearing in a double main event.

Billy Huff, popular reservation 150 pound champion will meet Freddy Gilbert of Bend in the first half of the double header and Pat McFadden, the iron horse of Klamath county, will face Spec Woods, veteran fighter who is attempting a comeback after a two-year layoff from the squared circle. The two bouts are billed for eight rounds apiece.

Huff and Gilbert should put up a fierce fight inasmuch as this is in the nature of a grudge fight to even old scores when Huff knocked out Gilbert in Klamath a year ago. McFadden is in perfect shape for his job and promises to take care of Woods in quick time. Backers of Woods in Chiloquin are strong in their praise of "Spec," who two years ago was fighting main events all up and down the coast. "Spec" has reformed and is in very good shape for this battle which he expects to win by a knockout.

Supporting this double main event will be four 4 round bouts featuring the class of preliminary talent in Klamath county. Eddie Jones, of Medford Point, and Kid Cepeland of Port Klamath, will renew their feud started on the last fight card here and promise to give some of the best entertainment of the evening. Both lads are red skins and rugged fighters making up in gameness what they lack in the science of the manly art.

Teddy Moore and Jess Harman will meet in four rounds of fast stepping. Moore hails from Chiloquin and Harman claims Pine Ridge as his home. The lumber city's pride says he's going to knock Moore, game Indian fighter, clear out of the ring. Harold Wright and Bud Shufelt, two lion-hearted 130-pound boxers will meet over the four round route in the third preliminary of the evening and will give a whirlwind of excitement while they last.

Ross Howard, Klamath Falls coming youngster, will meet Shorty Hayden of Chiloquin in the curtain raiser. These boys weigh 110 pounds and are very fast and shifty boxers.

JAP FLATTENED BY HEADLOCKS

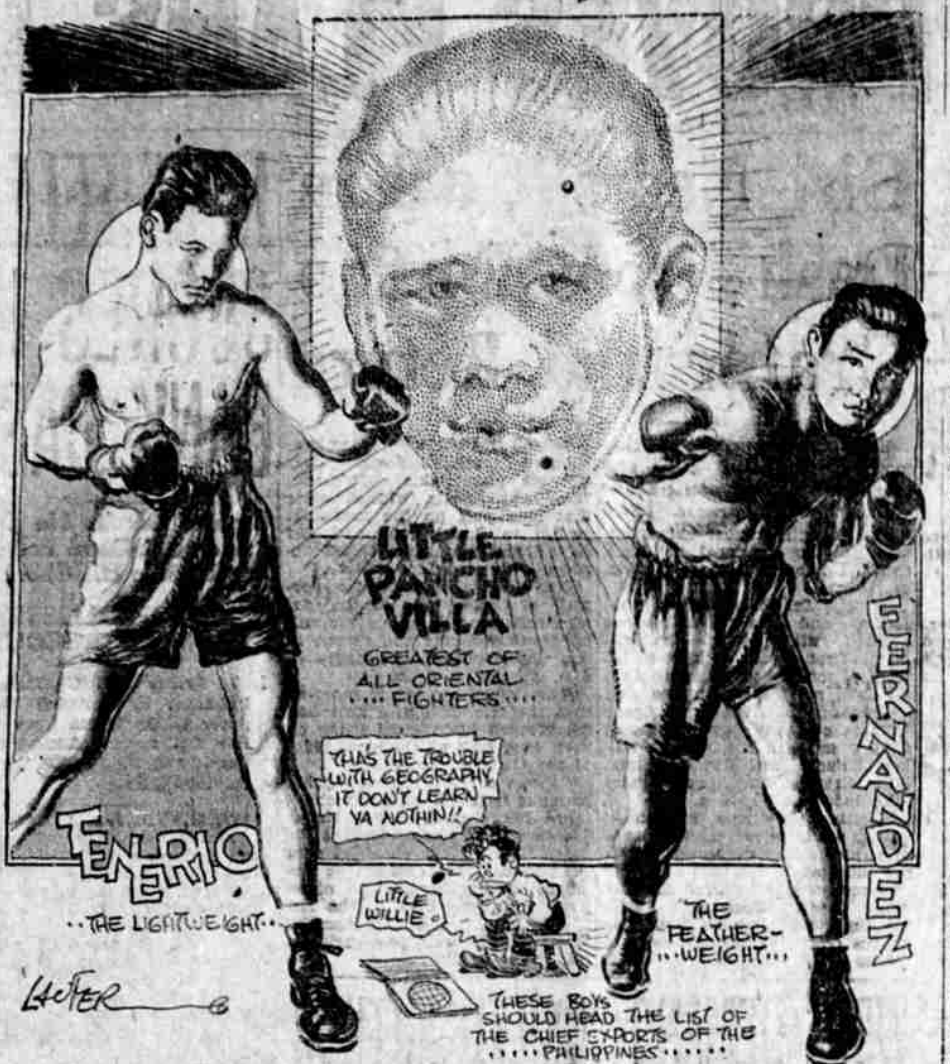

LOOKS AS IF CHIEF PRODUCTS OF THE PHILIPINE ISLANDS ARE Battling Fighters

The boys who compile the big red geography text books have evidently overlooked something.

In treating the exports of the Philippines, much space has been given over to the amount of sugar, coffee, copra, and so forth, that is yearly sent out from those tiny specks in the Pacific, but not one word of the game little brown men that have come over to win the hearts of the American fight lovers. How come?

Just how many of these two-fisted brown atoms have entered this land during the past decade is hard to guess, but right now two of their rank are among the elite in their respective divisions and seem destined to share ring laurels with the late Pancho Villa, first of the Polynesians to win world championship honors in the roped enclosure.

We refer to Ignacio Fernandez, featherweight, and Lope Tenorio, lightweight, both of whom are in our midst gunning for a crown.

Fernandez, the featherweight, made his American debut early last summer by stopping Abe Attell Golstein in less than a round at Chicago. Since then he has vanquished Joe Lucas, Johnny Farr, Harry Forbes and his stirring encounters with Archie Bell, Tony Canzoneri and Dominic Petrone will live long in the memory of the huge who appreciate action.

Tenorio is a late importation who started his American campaign on the coast, where he troubled even so good a performer as Jimmy McLarin.

Since then he has beaten Russ Whalen, Dick Hoppe and Billy Adams and just recently he turned back the highly feared Stan Loayza, Chilean lightweight, with a seven-round technical knockout.

Now his manager, Ike Dorgan, has offered \$50,000 to Sammy Mandell, lightweight champion, to give the brown "furry" a shot at the coveted diadem.

Philippine fighters have come to play an important part in our fight history. With the success of Pancho Villa, who garnered both the national and world flyweight titles in our ring, the punch throwers from the islands have been coming in droves.

Their coming has stimulated interest in the smaller divisions as the Philippine, without exception, are the most furious boxers in the ring today.

They fight with all the viciousness of their bolo-throwing ancestors and have readily adapted themselves to the American code of glove tossing.

Bill Tilden Says:

I am as pessimistic about the chances of the United States to regain the Davis Cup from France as are the writers on tennis. No matter how great a player may be, and tennis has produced a number of scintillating stars, time and effort will always produce a greater one. The United States lost a great player when Vincent Richards decided to turn professional.

Of more recent date, has been the proof that Bill Johnston and myself, as well as a number of other veteran players, are going back.

Turn to the pages of tennis history and you will find that Smith of England met his superior in Doherty; Rice of Australia met his Brooks; McLoughlin of America met his Williams, who in turn met his Johnston, and then I happened to enter the scene.

Tennis, like all other sports, runs in cycles, and for three or four years the French menace has been ever present. During the past year Lacoste, Cochet and other French stars have held the upper hand.

On form, it seems that France, with its long list of first-string stars and many prospective youngsters, should hold away in tennis for some time, but there is nothing certain about it.

For five or six years several of us veteran players have rather hogged the spotlight in tennis. Now that the older players all seem to be retrograding at the same time, I look for many new names to break into the headlines as far as tennis is concerned.

There are a number of younger players who are certain to help in regaining lost tennis prestige. It will be well to watch the youngsters like Lott, Doeg, White, Shields and others during the coming season. They should do well.
