Tells Why—

"One reason some counties in Oregon are so poor is that the federal government owns so much of the land. More than 60 per cent of our county is exempt from taxation because it is in forest reserve," declares O. L. Patterson, judge of Grant county. "We can't levy a cent against that land and it throws the cost of operating the county and our share of the state taxes on the 40 per cent that is not within the national forest. The assessment of Grant county is about \$9,000,000 and we have a bond issue for roads amounting to \$565,000. With the 60 per cent in the forest reserve placed on the tax roll the county would be in better financial condition." Morning Oregonian.
