



## Henley Takes Sturdy Bonanza Quintet Into Camp, 28 to 19; Girls Team Also Scores Win

 Henley High School's basketball teams succeeded in turning back both the girls and boys teams from Bonanza last night in two very well played games on the Henley floor. The boys from Bonanza were on the short end of the 28 to 19 score at the final whistle but they were never beaten until the last play had been completed.

Last night's game between the two schools showed some mighty fine real basketball. The old hammer and tongs days were never in evidence on either side, both resorting to the quick pass and breaking for their offensive drives. The play of Henley on their passing attack was far superior to anything ever displayed by that school's team and was the deciding factor in final score.

The Bonanza boys seemed to have all the possibilities necessary to put over a win and would take the ball down the floor time and again only to miss their try for the basket. This is the first year the Bonanza boys have played together and with a new floor, they didn't seem to be able to get under way. The Henley boys, however, clearly deserved last night's victory and the combination of Dixon, Ashley and Gober under their own basket showed the results of a great deal of play together.

Gober for Henley was easily the outstanding player of the game. He scored 19 of his team's points, being on the scoring end of every play. Besides making the high score he was in on every play on the defense and was fast enough to get the ball in good many times. Gober looked as good as any player Coach Heiken has shown during the last three years, even if he hasn't the size and power of some of the former stars from down there. For the Bonanza quintet, C. Gilman at forward was the best last night. This boy seems to have all the earmarks of a real basketball player. Although, like Gober, not of great size, he is fast and the hardest floor worker by far that Bonanza displayed in the game. He would break through the Henley defense on play after play but too often was entirely alone and would be covered or would miss in his hurry to shoot. With more experience on the floor in actual competition he will do his part to make Bonanza a mighty formidable opponent for any five. People, the other forward, and D. Gilman at center, played very well for Bonanza but seemed to lack that quick snap and drive on the offensive that means scores in the benches and victory in the end. Give these boys another season of work together and it will be a different story.

### Pelican City "Cracks" in Third Quarter to Lose Hard Game

Maintaining a gruelling pace for three hours and being but one point behind at the end of the third quarter, the Pelican City basketball team—apparently the fastest hoop aggregation in Klamath—"cracked" in the last quarter last night at the Pelican community hall and were defeated by the Medford national guard team, 54 to 36.

The same thing has happened in virtually every game that a Klamath hoop team has played with their Rogue River valleys. The Legionnaires, the Klamath county high school team and the Pelican City basketball team are "burned out" by the third quarter. Rogue valley teams are dubbing Klamath quintets "three-quarter" teams.

However, the game at Pelican City was one of the best ever played in the county and had a large crowd on its toes throughout.

Reaching the height of their game in the third quarter, the lumberjacks were trailing their opponents one point at the end of the third quarter. The score was 34 to 33. And then the Medford guard—the same team which, two years ago under the colors of the Medford high school, won the state championship and were contenders for the national title—swooped down upon the weakening Pelicans and quickly piled up 20 points while their opponents were annexing ten.
