The Indians' Protest

Smoldering discontent of Indians against Uncle Sam has again crystallized into a definite protest on the Klamath reservation, if despatches in news columns correctly inform us. We are not surprised. There has been and probably will be trouble just as long as the government declines to increase disbursements to their dusky-hued charges.

The shafts of Red Skin ire have been aimed at L. D. Arnold, reservation superintendent. There are a few, at least, who openly advocate his disposal. Mr. Arnold may consider himself lucky. It was not many years ago that one of his predecessors was openly threatened with being on the receiving end of a scalping party. The ominous threat was uttered by one of the old school Indians at a tribal council meeting. His suggestion was promptly quashed by his modern kinsmen of a younger generation.

Various and sundry charges—most of them general assertions—have been set up against the reservation superintendent. He is accused of not having the best interests of the Indians at heart, of not providing proper police protection, and more of like nature. His removal is demanded in these petitions which are being circulated on the reservation; and investigation of reservation conditions is sought.

But all these so-called causes of action against Mr. Arnold are merely war whoops and battle cries. The underlying and motivating cause of whatever trouble there is stirring out there on the reservation, is economic. Boiled down, the proposition is simply this: The government as the reservation overlord, has ruled that the immense fortune represented in timber and livestock range, should be exploited gradually; that as the timber is converted into cash, a certain portion should be utilized in reservation improvements, and that only \$400 or \$500 should be given annually to each Indian.

The government wants Indians to cultivate thrift and industry on their tribal lands rather than live solely on their inherited wealth. It hesitates to turn a golden flood of cash into the laps of 1200 and some odd Indians of Klamath.

With these facts in mind, one can easily understand the irreconcilable attitude of some Klamath Indians. They are wealthy; they know it; they want money in the worst way; they feel they are entitled to it; and they are mad through and through when the U. S. Indian service fails to disburse more than \$400 or \$500 a year in actual payments.

So there you have it. Reservation superintendents may come and go, charges may be filed, investigations may be prosecuted, but in the last analysis, the bone of contention is not up in the superintendent's office at Klamath Agency, it is some 3000 miles east of Klamath in the office of department of Indian affairs where major reservation policies are conceived and enacted.

News to Us

Word continues to come out of Klamath Falls to the effect that Representative A. M. Collier does not wish to stand for re-election. His enlarged ice plant, supplying ice to the Southern Pacific's Cascade line, requires too much attention, he claims, to permit his becoming a candidate.

If Mr. Collier is planning to drop out of politics just when he has secured a strong foothold at the state capital, it is news to us. To our knowledge, he has not conveyed the impression gained by the Voter to any of his Klamath constituents.

WALKING FISH

Indianapolis News: From Missions, Montana, comes the information that a strange creature known as a walking fish. The habitat of the axolotl is the Madison national forest in Montana, and a student in forestry receives the credit for its discovery. Although the axolotl is said to be at home in the water and regards the water as its natural environment, it sometimes is seized with the wanderlust and goes on hikes to the hinterland, these excursions lasting in some cases six months. Thus an axolotl that becomes dissatisfied with one lake does not spend the rest of its life mourning. It leaves that lake and wanders across the great open spaces until it finds another more to its liking.

A fisherman sitting on the bank of a stream would be somewhat surprised, no doubt, to see a large axolotl and several little axolotls swim up to the shore

line and then strike off across the country. Some new legislation would be necessary for the protection of such fish.

The discovery of the axolotl recalls the prize poem written a few years ago about "Hot Afternoons Were in Montana." Whether there is any relationship between the walking fish and a hot afternoon is something for the symbolists to determine, but just for the moment it does seem out of the ordinary for a state that produced such a poem to offer something new in curiosities.

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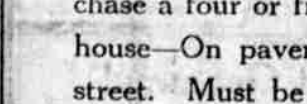
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FEAR FELT FOR SUBMARINE S-3
