"We feel we gained much valuable information from attending this semi-annual meeting at which several splendid talks by high officials were given," J. J. Miller commented on the meeting.

KLAMATH BASIN VOLCANIC PEAK TO BE STUDIED

WEED, Calif., Jan. 31.—Dr. R. H. Finch, resident volcanologist of the United States geological survey at the Lassen observatory, is investigating the recent volcanic activity of Glass mountain in the Modoc lava beds in this county, and found numerous gas tubes existing around the mountain.

Dr. Finch and a companion attempted to explore and photograph the mountain but were driven back by severe weather. They will make another trip to the top of the mountain when weather conditions are more favorable.

DIRECTORS OF DISTRICT SEEK HELP OF STATE

SALEM, Jan. 31. (AP)—The secretary and two directors of the Klamath irrigation district appeared before Governor Patterson and Attorney General Van Winkle Saturday asking that the state pay the expenses of a representative to be sent to Washington to work in the interests of a bill authorizing the government to be made defendant in a suit involving the California-Oregon Power company's contract with the government.

They were informed that the state is without funds for that purpose.

The proposed suit, in which the state or the irrigation district or both would be plaintiffs, would attempt to have set aside a contract between the government and the power company approved by Secretary of the Interior Lane in 1917.
