Oregon Quakes Dennis—

Chinese lettuce, a wild vegetable on the order of the milkweed (is having a striking effect on the sheep industry in Lake and Klamath counties, according to Bruce Dennis, newspaper publisher of Klamath Falls, who is in the city for a few days, says the Morning Oregonian. The Chinese lettuce grows on lower Klamath lake, and sheep are very fond of it. "You see," explained Mr. Dennis, "a few years ago the sheepmen were principally located in Lake county, but there came a period when there was no water to speak of, their lands dried up and grass was short, so the sheepmen moved the flocks over to lower Klamath lake, which has been drained. This was the turning point in the sheep industry. The sheep took a great fancy to the Chinese lettuce, and lambs fed on the stuff just rolled in fat and the sheep prospered prodigiously. The sheepmen, who had come over from Lake county, realized that they had discovered something good, so the Lake county sheepmen have established themselves in Klamath county. The future for Klamath looks bright. It is expected that the packing camps will open about the middle of February and soon the men will be sent into the woods. That means much to our county, and there will probably be 2,000 started for the forests. In Klamath the logging operations that down when snow comes, not so much because of the snow as because the snow is soft. One outfit is using a tractor, which enables it to operate most of the time in the snow, and some day there will be equipment constructed that will permit the logging to proceed without interruption throughout the entire winter. When that time comes Klamath will be sitting pretty. And say, we want the Modoc Northern constructed. It will be more beneficial to the state than an east-west railroad."

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 1, (AP)—Answering accusations made by Charles Scott yesterday testimony of the Union Service Association reflecting against the state corporation commission, the Portland Better Business Bureau and the Undertakers Association, Robert Mount, manager of the Better Business Bureau, dispatched a letter to Governor I. L. Patterson today in which he bitterly denounced Yates and made emphatic denial of charges "as they concern my office."

"Charges and insinuations made in Yates' letter insofar as myself and the Better Business Bureau are concerned are absolutely untrue," Mount wrote. "I have never held conference with the undertakers association regarding the permit of the Union Service Association. I naturally have been in contact with Mark

McCallister, corporation commissioner, on this matter, since, from our investigation, we believe the Union Service Association was founded on an unsound premise and is now being managed by Charles Scott Yates, who we believe is not of good business repute."
