



GERMAN TRACK STAR PREPARES FOR BIG RACE

Ray Dodge, Former O. S. C. Star, Principal Rival

CHICAGO, Feb. 6. (AP)—Dr. Otto Peltzer, German track star, came back from New York today to begin intensive training for the Illinois Athletic club games Friday night.

One of the men entered against him is Ray Dodge, a product of Oregon State college, who has run many a winning race for the I. A. C., and who will prepare himself on the same track as the German, flash word from New York is that Lloyd Hahn will not take part in the meet although I. A. C. officials said they had expected him to be here.

The games Friday will be run on a dirt track, said to be more popular than the board tracks with most entries. Additional competition for Dr. Peltzer was seen in the entries of Ray Conner and Jack Sittler.

Four crack college relay teams: Ames, Notre Dame, University of Michigan and the University of Iowa—are outstanding features of the meet. Laddie Myers, twice a member of the United States Olympic team and Drogemuller, of Northwestern university, both ten star are entered in the pole vault events.

Harold Osborn, holder of the world's record of 6 feet 8 1/2 inches and Anton Burg, a probable Olympic entrant are among the high jumpers to compete.

TRIS SPEAKER ON ATHLETICS

Statens Beat University by Single Point

EUGENE, Feb. 6. (AP)—Stunned by the 25 to 24 defeat at the hands of the Oregon State college basketball stars, the University of Oregon players were slowly recovering today, and were laying plans for revenge when the two teams met again in Corvallis Saturday night.

The game last Saturday was played before the largest crowd ever to witness a basketball contest here, a crowd estimated at 5,000.

S. Hubbard, assistant superintendent of the Fresno county schools. It was learned last night. The two letters, now in the hands of Los Angeles police, constitute the clues through which the police of that city are seeking the author, according to information received by the Republican.

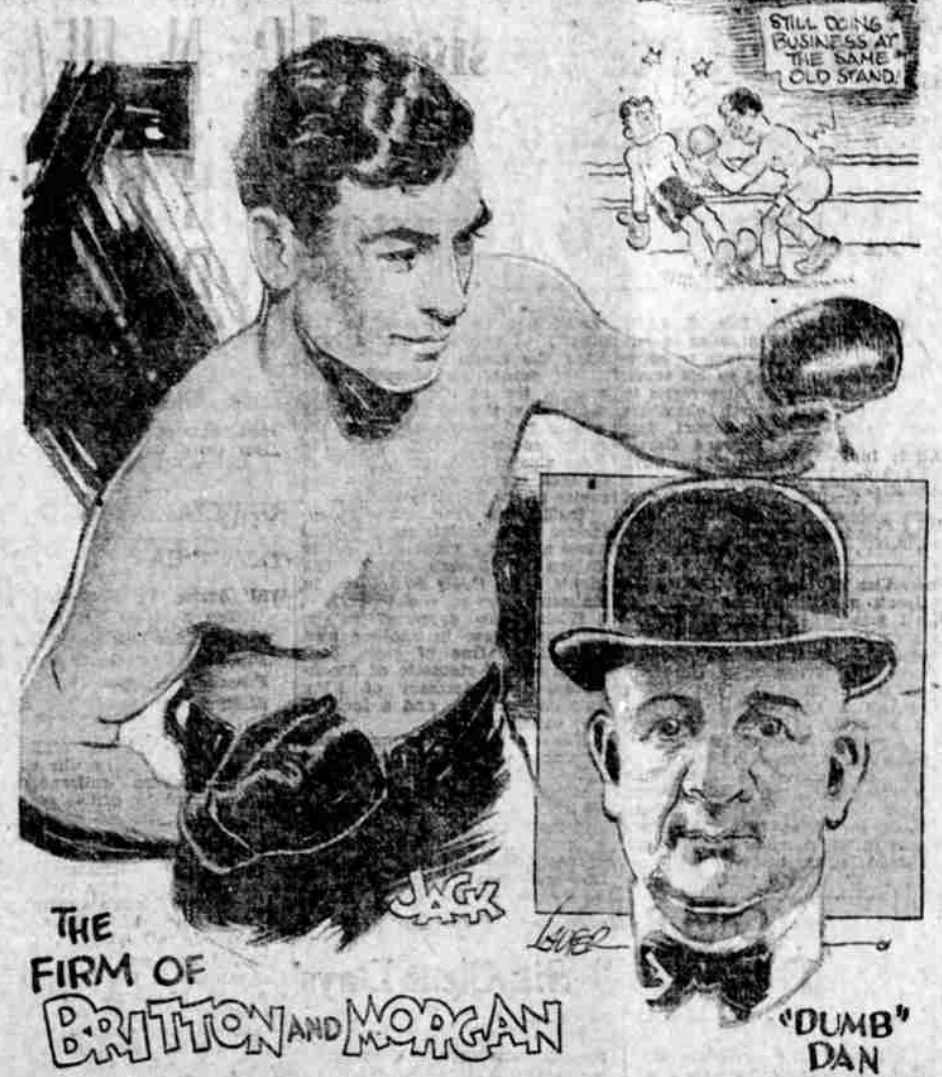

Boxing Firm Founded on Gratitude

That's the Story of Britton and Morgan Together for Twenty Years

One of the best known and certainly the oldest and most durable of the firms operating on the cauliflower market is that of Britton and Morgan.

There have been more broadly advertised firms like Kearns and Dempsey and some that antedated the million-dollar days of the business, but they all split up while the former welterweight champion of the world and "Dumb Dan" have been going for twenty years and are still going.

The story of how they became partners may be interesting as it produces some evidence that there still may be such a thing as gratitude in the racket.

Twenty years ago Britton was fighting around Philadelphia and he was a pal of an older and at that time more successful fighter who called himself Young Kid Broad.

Broad got an offer of \$20 to fight in New York and he took Britton along with him. The Kid was treated roughly in his bout, but he was satisfied with the twenty bucks and they decided to remain in New York and see the town as neither had been there before.

Walter Hagen Says: I'm a firm believer in the power of psychology as relating to golf or any other sport.

I'm with these football coaches every minute who have cards plastered all over the players' dressing room to this effect: "The team that won't be beat, can't be beat." "Think victory." "Have the will to win" and the like.

No doubt there are a lot of better golf players than I am, but not until the game or tournament in which I am participating is over and some player, other than myself, has been declared the winner, am I convinced of the fact.

Walter Hagen: "I'm a firm believer in the power of psychology as relating to golf or any other sport. The winner, as well as any other player who finished ahead, only has proved to me that in said event they were better than me. However, that doesn't hold good for the next game or tournament, for fame is fleeting in golf."

I have never entered any competitive golf match with a thought other than I was going to win. No matter how badly things might break for me, I always cling to the belief that my opponents may run into just as much tough luck.

While often disheartened, I am never discouraged over a poor shot from the tee. It is my thought that a good recovery will always wipe out a shot that lands in the rough.

My opponents fear me because they know I never quit, no matter how poorly I am playing. Incidentally, there is a reverse English to the power of psychology. For when players realize some one who never quits is a close contender, a player noted for coming from behind, that thought doesn't tend to make them play any steadier.

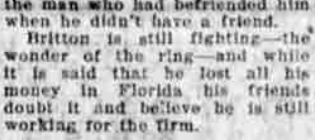
The two entered into a fist fight on the corner of Pine and Eighth shortly after one o'clock today. Thomas was charged with being drunk.

BEND, Ore., Feb. 6.—Two Bend ski runners who have been training on the Fort Klamath course, will be entered in the race from that point to Crater Lake on Washington's birthday. Both have recently become members of the Skyliners, local skiing club.
