New Mail Schedule Effective

The new mail schedule between Klamath Falls and valley cities which was announced through the columns of The Evening Herald several days ago was put into effect on Friday. The new service advances the service into this city by many hours. A night arrival brings the mail into Klamath Falls at 11:49 p. m. which formerly did not get in to this city until the following morning, shortly before noon. The mail is routed by the night force at the post office and ready for the early morning delivery. The route and schedule has been made possible through the co-operation of L. Rohm of the stage depot who has given his aid to the post office department in the valley as well as Klamath Falls.

To Increase Output

Plans for increasing the output of the California-Oregon box factory of this city 40 per cent during 1928 were discussed at the annual shareholders meeting held recently. An increase of 50 per cent in the volume of business done during 1927, compared with that done in 1926, showing the splendid growth of the local concern, was evident in the report made.
